## WHITE SOX COMING ON TRAINING TRIP

### Famous Squad to Be Divided and Play Alternating Games Here and in South

Charley Comiskey and his latest squad of Chicago American league ball tossers are speeding on their way to San Francisco as fast as a well equipped special train can carry them. This merry party will arrive here on Tuesday evening and as usual will make its headquarters at the Fairmont hotel. This is the third trip that the "Old Roman" of baseball has made to the coast for the spring training of his squad and it promises to be the greatest and most eventful that any major league club has ever attempted. Arrived in this city, the Sox will spend two days in limbering up and practicing before they trot out on the field to take part in their first game against the San Francisco Seals. In the meantime Danny Long will be showing plenty of speed in order to have his own bunch of tossers fit and ready to do battle with the Chicago aggregation.

### WILL DIVIDE HIS SQUAD

Upon their arrival here the Chicago boss will divide his squad into two sections. One will go to Los Angeles and play the Angels and semiprofessional teams in the southland, while the other will remain here to entertain the Seals. After the first week the teams will switch around. In the meantime each will make several junketing trips, taking on the various college teams and unives as can make the necessary guarantee.

Comiskey has a great aggregation of talent under his wing this year. He always has had, in fact, but this time his squad looks even more formidable than it did last year and the year before. Many of the veterans have been weeded out and their place taken by promising youngsters, who either substituted last season or who made good with fast minor league clubs.

### BUFFEY DIRECTS PLAYING

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Among the most promising of the young tossers are the two Coast league favorites, Hollie Zelder of last year's San Francisco club and Arnold Gaudil, the big Sacramento first baseman, who hit the ball so hard. Each seems sure of holding his job with the Sox, though neither is certain just where he will play. They will be tried out in several positions.

Billy Sullivan, the great little catcher, and the manager, Fred Parent, the Sox last year, will, as usual, do the heavy work behind the bat. Though not much of a hitter, Sullivan is one of the greatest catchers who ever lived and Parent is certainly one of the favorite with the fans of San Francisco as well as with those of Chicago, and a royal welcome awaits him.

Long's bunch is beginning to assemble and the team manager expects to have most of his tossers on the job in time to line up against the Sox.

Hull of Michigan, both Rhodes scholars at the university here, won the hammer throwing and quarter mile events, respectively, at the varsity meet held this afternoon. Putnam threw the hammer 151 feet 5 inches. Hull won the quarter mile in 51.2-5 seconds. Putnam's throw breaks the intervarsity record of 138 feet 10 inches established in the Oxford-Cambridge meet in 1909.

## TENNIS RESULTS VERY UNCERTAIN

### California Club Teams Matched in Doubles Play Varying Styles of Game

Two tennis tournaments will be completed on the local courts today. At the California club the handicap doubles tournament for the cups presented by Doctor Younger and Douglas Grant will be disposed of. The first and third class players will finish their tournament commenced on the Golden Gate park courts last Sunday.

The California club event is down to the semifinal round and the three remaining matches should all prove close and interesting. Two of the most heavily handicapped teams are still in the competition and each will meet a team playing from scratch. One half Harry Welbe and Sherwood Adams (cove 15) will oppose Cutter and Nourse (scratch), while in the other half Rose and Finnigan (cove 15) will meet Derby and Wescott (scratch). Welbe and Adams will find themselves up against two of the steadiest players in the club and will have to play pretty close to their old time form to dispose of their opponents. Cutter and Nourse simply get the balls back in good shape and depend upon their opponents' nets and outs to win. The old pony team is by no means as steady as they play a much faster game. Adams is in good shape at present, but Welbe is not as sure of his strokes as formerly.

In the other semifinal match the handicap team is the brilliant but unsteady one, while Rose and Finnigan play a steady, careful game. Derby relies almost entirely on his forehand drive and rarely uses any other stroke. Wescott's forte is his overhead work. He is a good smasher, but his back court game is not up to that of his partner. Rose and Finnigan play well in all parts of the court and can be relied upon to make very few errors.

The semifinal matches will be played in the forenoon while the final match is set for 2:30 in the afternoon. The semifinals will consist of two sets out of three and the finals three sets out of five. The cups have to be won only one and will go to the winner of the tournament permanently.

In the first class event at the park George Janes looks a sure winner. He won his matches last Sunday without exerting himself as he did last Sunday. The announcement that the students of the University of California are contemplating holding an interscholastic field day on April 20 in place of the C annual relay carnival is causing considerable discussion among the students of the various high schools, as well as the college men.

The Stanford interscholastic association, which has been holding "prep" school athletic meets for several years past at Stanford, had originally intended to hold its annual meet of this year on the first Saturday in May or the last week in April, and all the schools in the state were under the impression that such would be the case, but the story leaked out that California would hold a meet on April 30, so the Palo Alto boys have gone their Berkeley friends one better and set their meet for April 23.

The Bay counties league had set April 23 as the date of its meet, but this will probably be held either on April 2 or 9 in deference to Stanford. The basketball tournament for the Pacific athletic association championship will begin Tuesday night at the Columbia park boys' club. In the 110 Pastime athletic club will bring out entered.
