OUTSIDER WINS AT ODDS OF 15 TO 1 Bubbling Water at 8 to 1 Another Winner, Annexing the Feature

Yankee is said to have profited more than \$10,000 worth. Moral: See Yankee when you want to laugh. In this case the laugh began early. It was a purse race of the kind that seldom fills across the bay. When the drawing was held and likely Diouedonne's number was dropped somebody laughed and said "In a soft spot." Then all the horsemen joined in the guffaw, because such good ones as Hindoo and Prejulio and W. T. Overton were in the race, and on nothing he ever did in his life did likely Diouedonne ever figure to travel in that company. Therefore he was as good as 15 to 1 in the betting, regardless of the Yankee plunge. When the race came to be run Myles O'Connell cut out an awful pace, but quit conveniently when the joke got up to him. Prejulio ran an average race, to be third, and the real sprinters, Rey Hindoo and W. T. Overton, were prominent.

The day's feature, the Piedmont handicap, at a mile, was another race of the ordinary. Bedwell's mare, Light Easy, was the favorite, and Fort Johnson, in spite of the weight, caught the next place. It happened that Bubbling Water was meant to win again, and the price against her was as good as 8 to 1, notwithstanding her last victory with only a pound less in the saddle. Martin went out to make the pace with her, took her back on the last turn and came on in the stretch to breeze over Silver Knight. Fort Johnson was third, and Orbiular, who ran like the best horse in the race, was under wraps when he finished fourth. Bedwell's mare was messed up on the half mile turn and showed that she can do much better in this company. Helen Carroll was played into favorism for the opening, and made good. She was off in the ruck, but Glass sent her along nicely at the end and grabbed the victory by a nose from Tremargo, with Shilling up. Salvage was third, Thistle Belle, which seems to have found her track at last, won the second

Principal among them are: Saratoga handicap, \$7,500 guaranteed, 3 year olds and upward, mile and a quarter. Strata cup, \$5,000 guaranteed, 3 year olds and upward, mile and six furlongs. Champlain handicap, \$5,000 guaranteed, 3 year olds and upward, mile and a furlong. The Traverse, \$5,000 guaranteed, 3 year olds, mile and a quarter. The Alabama, \$5,000 guaranteed, fillies, 3 year olds, mile and a furlong. Saratoga special, \$5,000 added, including the cup, 2 year olds, six furlongs. Rensselaer handicap, \$10,000 guaranteed, 2 year olds, six furlongs. Flash, \$5,000 added, 2 year olds, five and a half furlongs. In addition to these stakes the Saratoga association has already closed the Hopeful, which will be worth more than \$20,000; the United States Hotel stake, the Grand Union Hotel stake and the Spinyway for fillies. All these stakes are for the 2 year olds.
