When asked today in Washington about the report that plans are under consideration for a general strike of streetcar men in Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Omaha and San Francisco, whose streetcar systems are said to be closely affiliated with the line in Philadelphia, Morrison would not affirm, deny or discuss the subject.

There is a report in circulation that the general strike was inaugurated primarily to unionize Philadelphia fully, and more particularly to place organized labor throughout the country on a sounder basis in the industrial world.

Arbitration Is Urged

The board of directors of the United businessmen's association appointed a committee of seven to call a conference of the banking, commercial and trade bodies, business associations and religious and fraternal organizations to bring about a settlement of the strike.

The commandant of the Philadelphia navy yard today issued an order forbidding leave of absence to men on any vessels at the yard during the strike troubles.

Secretary Neil Bonner of the Retail liquor dealer's association announced that the association had requested its members, as well as other cafe proprietors, to close their bars should disturbances occur in the vicinity and keep them closed until the trouble subsides.

Cabs Are Scarce

According to the figures of the union leaders more than 100 drivers have ceased work. The lack of drivers are conveying people to weddings and funerals, but are refusing all other fares.

The largest concern to shut down today was the Stand roller bearing company, 1,706 of whose men are idle.

May Be Arrested

The published statement that the labor leaders may be arrested charged with conspiracy is not taken seriously by the committee of ten.

The labor leaders, it was learned from another source, are taking no chances and have secured bail which will be entered for them if arrested.

PEARY REFUSES TO SUBMIT HIS PROOFS

Says Contracts With Publishers Prevent Disclosure of Data

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Commander Peary declined today to submit to congress the proofs of his discovery of the north pole.

Commander Peary and his friends say that contracts signed months ago with his publishers render it impossible to make his records and scientific data public now.

After hearing statements by Representatives Hobson of Alabama and Moore of Pennsylvania urging a congressional reward to Peary irrespective of the question of his proofs, the committee adjourned until Wednesday without taking action.

BRIDE ADMITS SHE IS MRS. KNOX JR.

Girl Who Eloped With Son of Secretary of State Goes With Him to Washington

PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 7.—Miss May Bolter, the young girl who ran away with Philander C. Knox Jr., son of the secretary of state, last Friday, declared tonight that she and young Knox had been married at 7 o'clock Sunday night at the home of a friend of Knox at Burlington, Vt.

The statement from Miss Bolter, or Mrs. Knox, as she says she is, was made only after a whole day of persistent refusals. She was located in her suite at 147 Benefit street this afternoon, and finally she said:

"Well, as long as I must, I will say that Mr. Knox and I were married at Burlington, Vt., at 7 o'clock on Sunday evening. It was at the home of a friend of Mr. Knox and a clergyman performed the ceremony. I do not remember his name, as Mr. Knox attended to all that. I will say no more about it now. We intended to tell all about it in a short time, but wanted to keep it secret for a while. Mr. Knox has a good reason for not wishing it known."

Young Knox Jr. and his wife left the city tonight for Washington at 9:07 o'clock. Up to the time the train left it was supposed that young Knox was out of town. When the federal express came into the station Principal French of Morris heights school was there with a grip.

Professor French went into a parlor car on the train and had hardly taken a seat when three young people, a man and two women, entered hurriedly and went into the compartment of the same car. They locked the door.

Professor French got the conductor to open the door of the compartment. The professor said it was an outrage that the girl should go to Washington and declared that he would have the Western police take the girl off the train.

Later young Knox identified himself and the couple proceeded unmolested to Washington.

1899, sentenced to life imprisonment. Her attorneys, Knight & Heggarty, fought the case to the very end. The supreme court reversed the findings of the lower court and ordered a new trial and she was convicted a second time. The case was again appealed, but without success. But from that time until October 20, 1909, it has been in the courts, the last decision coming from the district court of appeal, which refused to reopen the case.

Go to Penitentiary

Until May 16, 1906, she remained at the county jail and then, at her own request, was transferred to San Quentin penitentiary, her claim being that confinement in the county jail was unduly harsh.

She entered the penitentiary a physical wreck of her former self, but never did she give up hope of ultimately securing her liberty. At the last, when all hopes of pardon had gone and there seemed to be no other prospect than that of spending her days in the shadows of the penitentiary, her hitherto indomitable will snapped and she took to her bed, a hopeless invalid.

Apart from the dramatic settings her case was one of the most remarkable the country has known. Her conviction was based largely on circumstantial evidence, but of a kind so strong and the links of which were so strongly forged that no doubt existed as to her guilt. In the box of poisoned candy she sent a handkerchief, purchased from a local store, and it was through this little detail that the crime was eventually fastened upon her.

UNITED RAILROADS PLANS AUDITORIUM

Calhoun Considering Construction of Convention Hall on Fillmore Street Site

Patrick Calhoun and the United Railroads are considering the construction of a large auditorium on the United Railroads' property, bounded by Fillmore, Webster and Turk streets, which is now occupied by old car barns and the maintenance of way department of the street railroad corporation.

The idea of putting the auditorium on that property originated in the mind of Calhoun some months ago, and officials of the United Railroads discussed the proposition with officers and members of the Fillmore street improvement club. For some time the proposition lay in abeyance, but it is understood that it was revived shortly before Calhoun's departure for the east, and the plan will be put into execution after his return to San Francisco.

David Livingston, former president of the Fillmore street improvement association, stated last evening that he had heard that the plan for the United Railroads' auditorium was under consideration. "I heard of the plan," Livingston said, "and knew that it was under consideration. The Fillmore street improvement association would be glad to see any improvement erected on the street, and the plan of the United Railroads, if it is carried out, would naturally gratify us, but the association has nothing to do with the project."

The United Railroads owns the northern half of the block bounded by Fillmore, Webster and Turk streets and Golden Gate avenue. A brick power station is located on the northwest corner of the property, but the other buildings on the land are old. The intention of the company is to build the auditorium around the power station, removing the other buildings.

Stores would be located in the Fillmore street frontage. The gymnasium of the United Railroads athletic club would be located in the new building and the large hall would be available for public entertainments. When the Geary street railroad bonds were voted by the people, Calhoun decided that he would not spend more money in San Francisco, and the auditorium plan nearly fell through. But now it has been revived and is reasonably certain of consummation.

men were also engaged in watching the game and collecting evidence. This afternoon Taylor, Boyd, Under Sheriff Rudolph Lichtenberg and Deputies George Martin, George Agne and Richard Poladri took a launch at San Rafael and by traveling around Point Tiburon approached Sausalito. A landing was made surreptitiously at the San Francisco yacht club's house. The poolroom was quickly raided.

"It is the most infamous case of crooked poolroom work to my knowledge," said District Attorney Boyd. "The gang had fake telephones with no connections and they pretended that they played bets in San Francisco by wire, when nothing of the kind was done. One money bag had \$20 pieces on top and iron washers underneath. Packages of bills marked to contain \$1,000 were made up of \$1 bills with \$20 bills on the outside."

"Several big men are involved in this scheme," said Sheriff Taylor, "and some sensational revelations will be made. We have another case against them in which a man lost \$4,500." Supervisor Pistolesi was very peevish over District Attorney Boyd's attack on him, in retaliation, or to show his good faith, the attorney for the poolroom operators declared tonight that he is going to close the saloons at San Quentin.

MISSION ASSOCIATION STILL WANTS FRANCHISE

Devisadero Crosstown Line May Be Revised by Committee

The Devisadero crosstown franchise is to be revised by the board of supervisors, if a special committee appointed by the Mission promotion association last night is successful in its endeavor. The Mission district and the members of the association feel that the franchise is necessary and refuse to let it die as easy a death as it might if it were allowed to drop at this stage. It was reported at the meeting last night that the right of way for the Islais creek outlet sewer had been secured and that the work could now be started. The special committee appointed to secure subscriptions to defray the cost of parking Dolores street reported that it had been unusually successful and would have sufficient funds. A special committee was appointed, with instructions to boost for the location of the army in the Mission district. The report of the committee on streets and sewers recommended the repair of Lapidig street between Eighth and Nineteenth and the sweeping and sprinkling of the business streets of the district more often.

It was decided to ask for more police protection in the vicinity of the Horace Mann evening school on account of the Romanism of many of the boys in the neighborhood.

IDENTIFIES DEAD WOMAN AS HIS DIVORCED WIFE

William Russi of 3964 Mission street identified at the morgue last night the woman who died at the central emergency hospital Saturday night as his divorced wife. He said that she was given to drinking and that he secured a divorce from her on the grounds of intemperance last December. Mrs. Rosa Russi was found unconscious on the sidewalk by policemen at Twentieth and Harrison streets and she died shortly after reaching the hospital. She was 45 years old and was first married to William Wettstein. She had three children by Wettstein and one child by Russi.

BLOWS OUT BRAINS WHEN WIFE SUES FOR DIVORCE

Richard Bright of 2600 Diamond street, a boiler maker 45 years old, committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver at his home last night. His wife filed suit for divorce March 2 and since that time Bright had been drinking hard. The shot was heard by E. W. Thurman of Sussex street, who was passing Bright's house at the time. He forced the door and found Bright dead in the kitchen. The bullet had passed through his head.

revived at intervals during the board meeting. Supervisor Nelson was fearful lest he and his colleagues be blamed for the delay.

"I hope," he said, "that the daily press will not say that this matter has been delayed through any fault of ours when we are stopped by a court order."

Supervisor Cutten had something more cheerful to shed on the situation. "I have been authorized to say," he announced, "that if the bonds for that part of the Geary street road to run from Geary street down Market street to the ferry were offered for sale they would be bought at once. These parties tell me that if the bonds are supported by a Dillon & Hubbard opinion they stand ready to buy at once, but if we don't get a Dillon & Hubbard opinion they are willing to buy if they have a favorable opinion from certain local lawyers."

Cutten declined to give the names of the prospective bond buyers. "There will be no trouble about that," interposed McCarthy. "As to the Dillon & Hubbard opinion, we have to pay for that one way or the other. If we don't get their opinion we will have to pay the amount in the extra price of the bonds, for the purchasers will get their opinion."

Supervisors Baneroff and Murdock raised the point that the restraining order could not possibly keep the board from getting the Dillon & Hubbard opinion. It was first voted to get Long's opinion in writing, but when his message came over the telephone the board determined to proceed at once to get the expert ruling from the eastern attorneys.

MAKES HEROIC EFFORTS TO CHECK AUTOMOBILES

San Jose Farmer Gets Into Trouble for His Tactics

SAN JOSE, March 7.—John A. Jones, a rancher who owns an orchard on the El Camino real south of this city, was arrested today after throwing clubs and yelling at automobilists passing his place at a rate of speed which he claims is injurious to his fruit trees.

Jones stated in Justice J. T. Wallace's courtroom today that one of the automobiles passed his orchard at the rate of 150 miles an hour. He says that he knew this statement was correct, as he took out his watch and timed the machine.
