SOX LOSE OUT ON BOTH SIDES OF BAY

Seals Pull Off Batting Rally and Transbay Sluggers Laugh at Walsh

The Sox are lucky to be playing on the dear old Pacific coast instead of around their own south side lot. They would have a hard time squaring themselves with the Windy City fans for the two bloomers which they shot yesterday. Oakland routed them in the morning on the transbay field, 6 to 3. They were still game and full of hope when they trotted out on the greenward at Recreation park, but hope never wins ball games unless it is backed up with a few bingles. The Sox neglected to bingle the ball at the opportune moment, so they finished second once more. Score 7 to 2.

OLD FASHIONED RALLY

An old fashioned seventh inning rally hit it up for San Francisco. Up to that time they were running close, with the Seals one to the good. But one run came and a big bushy aggregation is nothing to boast of and the fans were calling for action. They would have been satisfied with one or two, but when four showed they worked themselves into a frenzy of glee.

Cap Mohler started the boys with a ripping two sacker against the center field fence. He had scarcely landed ere Mundorf ripped off another bird of the same variety into the right garden. This was the first run. Then Bodie doubled against the center field boards, but Mundy only got as far as third. Both of them beat it home when Busher Vitt cracked off another two cushion swipe right over the shortstop's head. Braddy laced out a nice one, but a perfect peg by Messinger nailed the youngster at the pan.

All these runs were made off Olmstead, who, by the way, seemed to have more on the ball than any of his predecessors. He used the spitter and it broke in every direction, but by some magic hook or crook the Seal batsmen met every one of them right on the pick with men on the bases. He held the locals to a hit each. It remained for Olmstead to scramble the eggs for the boys and this he did in a way that satisfied all the San Francisco rosters.

THAT KID VIT WAS THERE

Miller, the big Western leaguer, opened up for San Francisco and remained on the job until he pitched a ball, an error by Bodie in the second spasm being responsible for the tally which the Sox took off. Rex Ames finished the game, allowing one run and four bingles, a very creditable record.

The sensations of the afternoon were furnished by Vitt. The kid was a bear. He had six chances around that third sack and three of them were as tough as any anybody ever handled. He reared every time and never lost his head in the tight places. Incidentally, he polished off the good work with that two sacker in the seventh which netted a pair of tallies.

The Sox could not steal a single base on Monday. His wing was working just the way he wanted it to work and he kept them all hugging the bases in every inning. The Seals on the other hand got away with three steals on four tries. Neither team changed catchers during the game. The score:
