GLIDERS ENTERED IN AERIAL EVENTS

Motorless Flying Machines to Be Given Tryouts at Alameda Meet

ALAMEDA, March 31.—Seven gliders, aeroplanes without engines, have been entered for the aviation meet to be held here at the old Neptune gardens at the west end Saturday and Sunday.

The inventors of the various machines plan to give their contrivances tests during the meet. Two automobiles have been secured to give the gliders a flying start. Most of the machines are in the park, and others are expected tomorrow.

Prof. P. A. Van Tassel, a noted aeronaut, has a large dirigible balloon in the park. The big gas bag was given tryouts today, and when it soared aloft was gazed at by thousands. Gas mains have been laid into the park for the purpose of inflating the balloons that are to participate in an endurance and distance race to be held Saturday and Sunday.

The inflating of the gas bags will be started tomorrow.

Work on the grandstand and bleachers, which will accommodate 6,000 persons, is being rushed. The fences bounding Neptune gardens have been making a flight next week. The monuments on the outside from witnessing the display of machines and the events within. Five ticket windows have been arranged to accommodate the expected crowds.

One of the features of the aviation meet is to be open air lectures on the art of aerial navigation by Colonel Frank Johnson, who will also give demonstrations of his lectures in flights in a Curtiss biplane, which is now in the park. Colonel Johnson plans to make some of his flights over the shallow reaches of the bay on the south side.

Fung Joe Guey, a young Chinese inventor, who has been building a big monoplane in Webster street near Fourth for the last six months, has removed his alrplane to the Kerwin ranch near Elmhurst preparatory to making a flight next week. The monoplane is the largest that has been constructed in California, being 70 feet in length and having a spread of wings 48 feet across, and has an engine that it is claimed will give 75 horsepower. The engine was tested this morning and proved satisfactory.

FRED JURGEWITZ HELD TO HAVE BEEN JUSTIFIED IN SLAYING C. F. SMITH

OAKLAND, March 31.—Hearing the words that set free Fred Jurgewitz, the slayer of her husband, Mrs. Claud F. Smith swooned away this afternoon in Judge Brown's court. She had to be taken to the receiving hospital for treatment, so overcome was she by her failure to obtain punishment for the man who shot and killed Smith several months ago.

The jury that acquitted Jurgewitz was out only a few minutes and took only one ballot.

The verdict was expected, as much testimony given at the trial showed that Smith had quarreled with Jurgewitz and had tried to assault him before the shooting took place. Furthermore, after he was shot Smith admitted that he had got what he deserved. While on his deathbed at the receiving hospital he boasted of his conquest of Mrs. Jurgewitz. His family was bent on punishing Jurgewitz for killing him, however, and engaged Attorney Lin S. Church to assist in the prosecution.

BERKELEY COUNCIL ASKS CORPORATION TO INSTALL MAINS FOR PROTECTION OF CITY

BERKELEY, March 31.—For the purpose of securing the consent of the People's water company for the installation of \$4,000 worth of water mains the city council met with Engineer H. Wilhelm and C. D. Maloney of the corporation this afternoon. Estimates were gone over and the proposal of the council laid before the representatives of the company.

Seven new fire stations are to be built here, and the company has been asked to lay mains for better fire protection in the districts which surround the firehouses.

The new stations will be established in the Northlands and Claremont tracts, the factory district in West Berkeley, the section having Grove and Delaware streets as a center and in the southwestern and northwestern portions of the city. The council is also considering a proposal to establish a district in La Loma park.

The company has made no reply to the council's demand, as estimates of cost have to be prepared.
