HARRY C. DELL IS DETAINED IN JAIL

Will Be Held Pending Trial of Dr. Dunlop Moore

Harry C. Dell, the marine hospital nurse who is being detained as a witness against Dr. Dunlop Moore, charged with battery, was removed to the Alameda county jail yesterday afternoon to await the hearing of the case April 13.

Dell was detained subsequent to his disappearing twice when needed by the government and placed in the city prison. He protested against being held in jail and was taken before Judge Van Fleet of the United States district court yesterday in chambers.

Although J. H. Maney, the other hospital nurse who is said to have witnessed Moore's battery, disappeared to avoid giving evidence he has not been arrested, having promised to obey the subpoena served on him at Livermore.

Both speakers advocated the placing of advertising of some description in every section of the United States, including newspapers, as well as billboards, circular and novelty advertising.

Particular emphasis was laid on the fact that although today San Francisco has the finest hotels, stores, streets, as well as unlimited business facilities and resources many people of the east have not yet overcome the idea that the city at the Golden Gate is still striving to raise its head from the ruins of the conflagration of several years ago.

Colonel Walter S. Schuyler, Fifth cavalry, now at Schofield barracks, Oahu, has been ordered to meet his imperial highness, Prince Tsai Tao of China, who comes to the United States to study military systems of this country, and to conduct the prince and his party to New York.

MULGREY MAKES REPORT—County Clerk H. I. Mulgrevy's report for January, February and March, issued yesterday, showed that during that period the receipts of his office were \$37,814.60 and the expenditures on salaries \$25,450, leaving an excess of receipts of \$12,364.60.

SORORITIES DIVIDE EDUCATION BOARD

Two Members Insist That Girls Should Be Asked to Resign From Societies

Appropriations for School Buildings Reduced and Lakeview Changed to Farragut

The board of education is equally divided as to what should be done with the young women who have joined sororities since the enactment of a state law prohibiting such societies in the high schools. At the weekly meeting of the board yesterday Director Henry Payot maintained that the girls should be given a chance to resign from the sororities before being suspended from the schools. Director Whelan agreed with him.

President Bannerman, however, argued for the mastery of the law and its immediate enforcement. He was in no mood for compromise, and Mrs. Kincaid seconded him. A deadlock ensued and the matter was put over for a week.

Bannerman announced that pursuant to the board's order the principals of all the high schools, except Lowell, had sent in the names of the girls who had joined the sororities since last May.

CUT IN APPROPRIATIONS

A matter of almost equal importance in school history was the report of the joint committee of the building committee of the board of supervisors and the building and grounds committee of the board of education. Cuts were made in practically every appropriation originally intended for the construction of new school buildings. The cuts were as follows: Adams school, from \$120,000 to \$110,000; Cleveland, from \$75,000 to \$60,000; Cooper, from \$100,000 to \$80,000; Franklin, from \$120,000 to \$80,000; Girls' high, from \$45,000 to \$30,000; Grattan, from \$100,000 to \$50,000; Irving, from \$80,000 to \$60,000; Jackson, from \$100,000 to \$60,000; Jefferson, appropriation entirely rescinded, as not needed; John Sweet, from \$120,000 to \$75,000; Lowell, high, from \$450,000 to \$300,000; Lincoln, from \$120,000 to \$50,000; Mission high, additional appropriation totally rescinded; Marshall, from \$100,000 to \$50,000; Oriental public, from \$80,000 to \$75,000; Peabody, from \$100,000 to \$50,000; Starr King, from \$75,000 to \$60,000, and Spring Valley grammar, from \$120,000 to \$75,000.

INQUIRY AS TO PAYMENT

It was pointed out that \$1,200 had already been paid out for plans for the Spring Valley, and that the plans had been approved. This matter will be investigated.

A resolution was passed forbidding the pupils to contribute or to be asked for contributions or assessments for any purpose whatever by teachers or principals.

The name of Lakeview school was changed to Farragut.

The Golden Gate kindergarten association was granted permission to establish kindergartens in public school buildings, but was required to pay the cost of equipment and the salary of a teacher.
