County Committee Authorizes Selection of Delegates to Los Angeles Conference

Instructions Prohibit Commendation of Any Candidate at Coming Primary

The letter and the spirit of the direct primary law and the good faith of the democracy of San Francisco are in the hands of Sidney Van Wyck, Charlie Fay, Tim Reardon, Louis Mooser and Pete Hagkerts. They will select today 101 delegates to the democratic state conference in Los Angeles.

PROGRAM GOES THROUGH

When Chairman Tom Hickey entered the hall the program had proceeded him by a lap. Reardon was entrusted with the motion to dispense with the roll call and Van Wyck with the resolutions instructing the San Francisco conferees to preserve the direct primary law by voting against indorsement of any candidate for any office.

APPOINTMENT NEGLECTED

The resolutions providing for the selection of the conferees made no reference to the appointment to the districts, and the Bell democrats wandered out into the night fairly convinced that their names would not be among the chosen.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Here are the resolutions designed to reinforce the San Francisco delegation fight for the letter and spirit of the direct primary law: Resolved, while authorizing and providing for the appointment of 106 representatives of the democratic party of San Francisco to the conference to be held in the city of Los Angeles on the 12th of April, 1910, the democratic city and county committee of San Francisco reaffirms its support of the principle of the direct primary law, and while recognizing the defects and shortcomings of that act, insists that it is a step in the direction of complete government by the people.

GOVERNMENT AID FOR RAILWAY OPPOSED

Chairman Hamilton frankly told the promoters he believed the government should decline to lend its aid to any project unless a large public benefit would be conferred.

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
