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TO EXPLOIT FAIR IN ALL COUNTRIES

Publicity Committee of Panama-Pacific Exposition Plans a World Wide Campaign

The publicity committee for the Panama-Pacific exposition has begun a campaign among all branches of foreign business houses here, and all local firms doing business in other lands to aid in every way in spreading knowledge of what San Francisco purposes to offer the world in the way of entertainment.

As an example of what may be done in the work of educating the earth the committee members point to the action of a local firm of exporters and importers, Maldonado & Co., which has had printed thousands of cards that will be distributed throughout Central and South America.

On the placard is an invitation printed in Spanish to visit the exposition, a hint of the pleasure that may be expected, and the firm's good wishes. A question of division of labor has arisen among the exposition committee concerning the subcommittee which should have the power of naming the delegation that is to go to Washington to present San Francisco's claim to the exposition to congress.

It was decided at a meeting of the publicity committee yesterday to send personal letters to all papers published outside of this city, agreeing to send them regular news concerning the exposition. The letter also asks for suggestions regarding publicity, and points out that the great fair is to be of enormous benefit to the whole coast.

SCOT SINGS FOR JUDGE AND CASE IS DISMISSED Accused of Peace Disturbance; Warbles Himself Free

"I was singing Harry Lauder's songs," said Robert McIvor to Police Judge Conlan yesterday, "and a German waiter told me to stop, but I would not stop until I had sung 'I was singing' and he'd in a policeman and had me arrested for disturbing the peace."

McIvor said he was a plasterer and lived at 87 Valencia street, and he also belonged to the Robert Burns club. The judge, dismissing the case, told McIvor that when he had an entertainment to give he would send for him.

NEWS of THE LABOR WORLD

Edited by O. M. BOYLE Max E. Licht, president of the retail clerks' international protective union, residing in this city, has been made a general organizer and label agent of the American federation of labor. This office carries with it power and authority to found and install local and federal labor unions under the jurisdiction of the American federation of labor.

Licht has performed good work for his organization, and the officials of the American federation of labor, recognizing his abilities as an organizer, have recently in attaching him to the parent body.

Branch 3, amalgamated society of carpenter and joiners, elected the following officers last night: F. W. Merriman, president; J. Dowsett, vice president; J. Farnsworth, check steward; M. Schenk, door keeper.

The branch voted to affiliate with the American Federation of Labor and elected J. Sampson and George F. Staff as delegates to that body.

It was announced that arrangements have been completed for the whist party next Friday and for the ladies' night, April 13.

J. Edward Morgan of the western federation of miners received a letter yesterday from the headquarters of the federation which stated that the question of affiliating with the united mine workers of America, which will be decided by referendum vote, will carry by 9 to 1. This will bring the federation under the jurisdiction of the American federation of labor.

At a meeting of the union printers' aid society last Sunday William H. Forbes and Louis H. Nordhausen were admitted to membership. The secretary reported that the annual outing will be held at Fernbrook park Sunday, June 19.

The Kern county building trades council requests the Call to publish the following in its labor column: The contractors in this vicinity are rushing like mad to complete the work on the new hotel at the corner of Broadway and the present month there will be half of our 300 men idle. During the last week the work has been very slow, and there is but little work until it will be a waste of money for men to come here seeking work.

It might be added that at the present time 10 per cent of our men are out of work and there will be a day in the number until within a month they will reach 50 per cent.

GREAT RESULTS BY SELLING FORCE

"Flying Wedge" of United Manufacturers Has Done Much to Stimulate Trade

L'HOMMEDIU As a result of the last week, in which the members of the "flying wedge" have called on most of the owners of automobiles, demonstrating the motor car accessories and devices made by the United manufacturers, W. L. Hughson, western representative of the manufacturers, reports one of the largest increases in the amount of sales of these supplies on record.

Not only have the owners placed their orders with the jobbers from whom the agents and jobbers in the vicinity of this city have met the salesmen with approval, owing to the fact that the orders taken by them have been placed with local dealers. One of the particular features of the "flying wedge" has been the demand for the automatic wind shield and the Jones live map meter.

Both of these devices are among the latest things for motor cars, and their adaptability for all kinds of motoring results in their popularity.

Hughson, in speaking of the results of the efforts of the "flying wedge," said: "The innovation which the United manufacturers have started in sending a corps of well drilled salesmen throughout the country for the purpose of demonstrating their goods is one of the best means of advertising which I have ever seen. This certainly proved a success in the manner of getting orders for the jobbers from whom the motor cars who had not otherwise purchased if the men did not call on them."

The "flying wedge" will leave within a few days on their tour through the northwest.

H. F. Brinkman, manager of the local branch of the Bosch magneto company, said yesterday that he had received word from the factory at Stuttgart, Germany, that 125,000 magnetos were manufactured by the Bosch company during the year 1909, and 433,317 all told for January, 1910.

ENGINEER SUBMITS BULKHEAD PLANS

Harbor Commission Considers Barker's Specifications for Seawall Construction

The harbor commission granted permission yesterday to the North Pacific steamship company to build an addition to its office on Vallejo street wharf. The board met yesterday for the purpose of considering the plans and specifications for more seawall construction, and while in session disposed of the routine that had accumulated since the last meeting.

Engineer Barker submitted plans and specifications for a bulkhead wharf to complete the remaining portion of section 11 of the seawall. The estimate for the work is \$28,000. He also submitted plans and specifications for the construction of seawall and bulkhead wharf to be known as section 10. The cost will be about \$17,000.

On the motion of Commissioner Teller the rental charged transportation companies occupying space in the ferry depot was fixed on the following basis: First floor, 12 1/2 cents per square foot. Second floor, 5 cents per square foot. Dolphin space, 3 cents per square foot.

The new rates will go into effect May 1 and will increase the revenues of the ferry depot by \$2,000 a month.

Secretary Thorp read to the board a letter from the city fire commission thanking the harbor board for assistance rendered by the state fire Governor Markham in handling the fire on the ship George Curtis. The fire commission specially expressed its obligation to Captain Carl Sault, Chief Engineer W. H. O'Donnell, Fireman T. F. Dolan and Deck Hands John Jacobson and John Wessling of the tug.

DE LAVEAGA GRILLED BY SAM SHORTRIDGE Contestant for Greater Share of Fortune Cross Examined

Miguel de Laveaga, contestant of the will of his sister, the late Maria de Laveaga, who left him only \$30,000 of her \$2,000,000 estate, submitted to a long cross examination yesterday at the hands of Attorney Samuel Shortridge. A letter written by the contestant's deceased wife to Maria de Laveaga was introduced and identified by the witness. The proponent of the will insists that the letter would not have been written by Mrs. de Laveaga had she believed her sister in law to be of unsound mind.

J. DALZELL BROWN SUED FOR RETURN OF \$40,000 Construction Company Seeks to Recover From Banker

J. Dalzell Brown, formerly president of the California safe deposit and trust company, who was convicted of embezzlement and sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment in San Quentin, was sued yesterday for \$40,000 by the Western construction company. The complaint alleges that when F. Haas, president of the construction company, paid that sum to Brown without authority from the company.
