TRACK TEAMS ARE FIT AND CONFIDENT

California and Stanford Will Clash on the Cinder Path Saturday

With the seventeenth intercollegiate field day between Stanford and the University of California but two days away interest in both colleges and, in fact, all over the state runs high. The rival teams have practically completed their training and the men look to be in shape to make the fight of their lives in the various events.

The recent victories which the cardinal has won on the baseball diamond and on the Oakland estuary has tended to sway public sentiment in its favor and there is no question but that the Stanford team will be a strong favorite over its old rival when Saturday rolls around. There are many conservative authorities, however, who look for California to spring a surprise.

Stanford will have the advantage of competing on its own oval and this is one point in the cardinal's favor. The men have been practicing there all season.

Strangely enough, the admirers of each team do not claim a victory by going to give the other credit for having a splendid chance, all of which goes to show that the teams are evenly balanced and should run neck and neck.

In the relay, which many think will decide the matter, Stanford will have a speedy team, which will probably be composed of Wyman, Carter, Stolz and Taylor.

According to a well known Stanford man's figures, the cardinal should win the meet by a score of about 65-57. His "dope" in the various events is as follows:

100 yard dash—Coleman first, Reed second, 22.0 yard dash—Coleman first, Reed second, 440 yard dash—Wynn first, Stolz second, 880 yard run—Wynn first, Porter third, Mile run—Porter third, Two mile run—Newman first, Tompkins third, High jump—Evering second, Tompkins third, 120 yard hurdle—Horn first, Argabrite third, Road jump—Bell first, Thayer second, Shot—Horton first, Taylor second, Hammer throw—Woolley first, Taylor second, Pole vault—Bell first and second, Javelin—Stanford.

Binocular Gamest In a Hard Drive

Beats Thistle Bell Head After an Exciting Duel Through the Stretch

Close finishes marked three of the races at Emeryville yesterday, the most exciting being in the feature event when Binocular and Thistle Belle fought it out the greater part of the final sixteenth. In the last few jumps Binocular outgamed the mare, beating her a head. Thistle Belle ruled favorite and set a merry pace, with Sewell in close attendance most of the way. Goldinn closed fairly well and was in view.

Binocular was particularly the case with Rubric, which opened early favorite for the third with Dixie Dixon. The field was bunched up when the barrier was sprung and Rice pulled up badly. He made up much ground after being practically left, but finished outside the money. Dixie Dixon got up in time to beat French Cook a head.

Head. Graney, favorite for the last race, stumbled at the start and failed to cut any figure. Hex was in front all the way, winning from Gelloco and Lord Clinton.

The first race presented a very open appearance and Burning Bush and Arthur Hyman were the most fancied. They finished outside the money. Sainnet won from Mollie Montrose and Anthony.

Mentry put up a powerful finish on Argonaut in the second and he won by a neck from Tramator, the favorite. Emma G was third. E. M. Fry and Argonaut strove for the lead, but Emma G made a great run through the stretch, and E. M. Fry edged each other into the ground in first and both stopped to a walk.

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
