
Merlingo, at 30 to 1, Tops List of Outsiders That Upset the Wise Brigade

Six favorites went down to defeat at Emeryville yesterday, and as a result form players left the track in a much different frame of mind from what they did Monday, when first choices were so successful. A number of heavily played horses ran far below their true form and in most of the cases incompetent rides of interference were responsible.

The greatest upset came in the mile and a quarter event, fourth on the card. Miss Naomi was plucked on as if by the race was all over, with J. R. Laughrey a fairly well supported second choice.
