OAKLAND, April 19.—The California and Nevada department of the Grand Army of the Republic opened its forty-third annual encampment at Rice institute, San Pablo avenue and Seventeenth street, this morning at 10 o'clock.

More than 1,000 uniformed veterans formed in line before the Hotel St. Mark at 9:30 o'clock, and led by the Los Angeles drum corps, marched to Rice institute with old drums beating and flags flying in the air, just as in the days of the war.
