Martin Nathanson yesterday announced the entries for the 1915 Exposition handicap, at one mile to be run Saturday, April 30. They are as follows: Polly L. Bishop, W. Jim, Fern L. Bnoear, Orburial, Kid North, Bubbling Water, Chester, Krum, Incontinent, Banorella, Heidem, Galvesia, Miles and Edwin T. Fryer.

There is much interest among turfmen in the bill passed by the Canadian parliament regarding racing. The new law recognizes book making, but selling or any form of betting as legal when done on an incorporated racetrack. It makes the streets and public places for betting. Meetings for runners are restricted to seven days and for trotters to three days, and not more than two meetings a year shall be held. These privileges will not apply to any new tracks established more than three miles from a Canadian city of 15,000 inhabitants. This is intended to prevent new tracks being operated on the Canadian border, but those in existence are protected.
