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SWATERS FINALLY CRAWFORD JOINS WON BY CHAMPIONS ALL AMERICA TEAM

Brooklyn and Pittsburg Share Noted Rugby Forward Accepts Invitation to Make Tour of Australia

D. P. (Babe) Crawford, the finest Rugby forward, bar none, who has ever followed the pigskin in this country or Canada, and probably one of the greatest forwards in the world, yesterday definitely accepted the invitation to join the All America Rugby team to tour Australia.

Crawford stands 6 feet 3 inches in his shoes and tips the scales at 210 pounds. Crawford is the only man on the team who would stand any chance of being selected on an international team in any part of the world. He is in the very manner an international and will stand very favorable comparison with any forward in any part of the world. He will be the heaviest man playing the game in Australia.

It is to be regretted that the team is not more representative than it is. Several of the very best men could not make the trip, but still there are other men who should have been selected and would have gone. Foremost among these is Homer, the Nevada three-quarter. Next to Holman from Stanford, the Nevada man should have been given a position on the three-quarter line. Homer is an ideal center man, but is also an ideal wing three-quarter, and it is such men that can be played in any position that the team would like to have.


As to the team selected it can be safely said that it is a "forward team." The forwards are an exceptionally strong lot, and will greatly outweigh their Australian opponents. It remains to be seen, however, if this advantage of weight will be of any material benefit to the team. From my knowledge of Australian Rugby it seems that while the local forwards will hold their own (and probably do a little better) with their opposing forwards, yet the backs of the team are palpably weak in comparison to the backs they will meet.

The international games against Queensland, in Brisbane, and against New South Wales in Sydney, can hardly be expected to be won by the local team. The games against the different club teams ought to be wins for the local team, though they will be hard fights.

JEFF STEPS ON HIS OWN FOOT IN RING

President of American Power Boat Association Issues an Appeal to Owners

H. T. Koerner, president of the American Power Boat association, has issued a circular letter to the members of the organization, appealing for the organization of local sections of the parent body. Motor boating as a sport is on the increase the country over and is just about making itself known on San Francisco bay and its tributaries. All the local yacht clubs have added motor boat regattas to their schedules this season. Koerner says: "In the articles of association the object is set forth clearly and distinctly, as follows: The object of the association is to promote the use of power boats and the improvement of their design and power construction; to formulate rules to govern trials of speed and endurance between such boats, and to govern the interests of the clubs composing its membership."

"Each local section is to elect its own officers, adopt its own distinguishing name, conduct its business in its own manner, and shall have the power to adopt such local rules and regulations as it sees fit. The chairman of such local section becomes a vice president of the American Power Boat association. This council will use its collective power against all assaults, and against any detrimental efforts affecting the best interests of motor boat users."
