STOCKTON, May 12.—The entire city is expected to participate next Saturday in the campaign to raise \$20,000 for the erection of the Salvation Army building and the workmen's hotel.

The members of the sextet, Paul Smith, Harry McIsaacs and Robert Schmidt, will represent the girls of the sextet, while Nellie C. Peterson, Clarence Guernsey and Franklin Warner will be their partners. G. E. Reynolds will be the soloist.

Friday night a benefit performance will be given at Masonic music hall. The proceeds, from which \$2,700 was netted, will be used for the same purpose. The show will be repeated on May 20 and 21 for the Salvation Army building fund.

MURDERER OF RANCHER GIVEN FIFTY YEARS

James McFarland, Who Feigned Insanity, Escapes Maximum

MARTINEZ, May 12.—James McFarland, who murdered Manuel Garcia last August near Livermore, was sentenced this morning by Superior Judge Lattimer to 50 years in San Quentin. McFarland killed Garcia on a lonely ranch near Livermore by shooting the rancher in the back and then crushing his head with an ax. The motive of the robbery.

McFarland then fled to San Jose, where he was captured by Sheriff Langford. He was imprisoned in Martinez, and subsequently went insane and was committed to the Stockton state hospital. It was found out in Stockton that he was not insane, but just feigning. He was then returned to Martinez, and allowed by the district attorney to plead guilty to murder in the second degree.

The judge, on account of the influence of friends, did not impose the maximum penalty, life imprisonment.

LAUCK ORDERS MORE COAST ARTILLERY

Additional Companies Authorized by Adjutant General

SACRAMENTO, May 12.—Two new companies for the coast artillery corps, one to be in San Diego and the other at San Francisco, were ordered formed by Adjutant General Lauck in orders issued today. The eighth company will be established May 15, being made up of about half the fifth company.

Permission was granted by the adjutant general to recruit the fifth company to such an extent as to permit the taking of 60 enlisted men from it for the purpose of organizing the additional company.

The ninth company of coast artillery corps will be the official title of the additional organization in San Francisco. It will be mustered in May 19. This company will be made up of 71 new members, making the seventh company of artillery for the bay metropolis.

COLLECTOR, SHORT IN ACCOUNTS, IS MISSING

Neil McNab Sought by Water Company at Port Costa

MARTINEZ, May 12.—Neil McNab, collector for the Port Costa water company, has been missing since Sunday morning, May 8. He is about 4500 miles in his accounts and is known to have contracted several hundred dollars' worth of debts in Crockett and Port Costa.

He was last seen in the office of the water company Sunday morning. He left a wife and two children in Port Costa.

His description is as follows: 23 years old, 124 pounds weight, 5 feet 6 or 7 inches tall, light gray eyes, prominent eyebrows and nose, hair dark, mixed with gray, worn short; smooth shaven. Wore blue serge suit, black derby hat and low cut tan shoes.

The boys were wadded to the dime novel. They have confessed.

BIG HAGGIN TRACT FINALLY IS SOLD

Minnesota Capitalists Purchase Famous Grant for Slightly More Than \$1,500,000

Announcement was made yesterday that the long pending negotiations over the famous Haggin tract north of Sacramento, known as Rancho del Paso, practically had been completed. The purchaser is a syndicate of St. Paul and Minneapolis capitalists and the price something in excess of \$1,500,000. The holdings, comprising 44,000 acres, will be placed under irrigation, cut up and sold in the form of small farms to eastern and foreign agriculturists. One part of the plan is said to contemplate the colonization of a portion of the area with Dutch and German families.

The final papers are to be signed in a few days and then the property will be turned over to its new owners. Frank G. Drum, the local representative of the Haggin-Tevis interests, and to the owners of the ranch, and O. A. Robertson, of St. Paul for the purchasers. Associated with Robertson are George W. Butler and J. E. Rogers of Minneapolis. They represent a group of capitalists who intend to organize a great land and colonization company. It is understood they will operate under the name of "The Union Pacific Colonization Company."

The parties to the transaction have been negotiating for nearly a year. The deal was almost completed several months ago, but a disagreement threw the matter into the courts. There was some uncertainty over the price. The purchasers were willing at that time to pay \$1,500,000. It is stated that the figure has been raised slightly.

The Rancho del Paso borders on the city of Sacramento and extends along the bottom lands of the American river. The soil is exceedingly rich and will lend itself readily to irrigation. It is generally conceded that this is one of the choicest parcels of land in the state.

LODI MEN PLAN TO OPEN THIRD BANK

Capital of \$100,000 Subscribed by Promoters

STOCKTON, May 12.—According to a well founded report Lodi is to have another bank. The town now has two banking institutions, but business has grown to such an extent that another is believed to be necessary.

It is said that most of the capital—\$100,000—has been subscribed. Among those said to be interested are: M. W. Shildy, C. L. Van Buskirk and W. E. Johnson of Lodi. Several Stockton men are also backing the project.

Capitalists at Tracy are also working on the organization of a second bank. The new bank at Ripon will soon be open for business.

TAHOE PHONE LINES SOON TO BE REPLACED

COMET IS BLAMED FOR THUGS' WORK

Lights Turned Off for Star Gazer and Robbers Get Busy in Stockton

STOCKTON, May 12.—Taking advantage of the darkness caused by shutting off the electric lights, in order that the people who so desired might better see Halley's comet, two masked robbers entered the Imperial hotel at 3 o'clock this morning, held up Night Clerk J. L. Urquhart and made him open the safe. They secured \$50 and some stamps and made their escape.

Urquhart was unfamiliar with the combination of the safe, and it was with difficulty that he convinced the robbers of the fact. They threatened to blow his head off if he didn't hurry. They then went through his pockets, and after taking his watch and loose change, returned the timepiece, which bore his initials.

They forced the clerk to a back room while they went through the till, from which they took \$48. Urquhart crawled to a telephone and notified the police. Patrolman William Simpson dropped in at the hotel a few minutes after the robbery, but on account of the darkness could not trace them. By the time word was sent to the powerhouse and the lights turned on the men had disappeared.

Branch's sporting goods house was robbed, and it is the opinion of the authorities that the burglars secured from the store the weapons which they used at the hotel holdup. The description of the weapons given by the clerk answered that of the revolvers taken.

SCHOOL CENSUS TO SKIP ORPHANS

Children in Public Institutions Not to Be Counted, Says Superintendent Hyatt

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, May 12.—That whole orphans who have no guardians should not be counted in the school census, but that half orphans should be counted in the district in which the parents or guardians reside, is the decision given today by State Superintendent of Schools Hyatt to state inquiries.

The state apportionment of school funds gives about \$10 a head to the district for the average daily attendance of students, so where an orphan asylum sends a hundred or more children to school it helps swell the funds. The school districts also get \$550 for each 70 children in the district.
