

COFFROTH MOVES TO BREAK FIGHT LAW

Puts on a Couple of Youngsters at Colma Just to Get Them Arrested

COLMA, May 23.—For the purpose of testing the anti prize fight law, which District Attorney Joseph J. Bullock recently stated he would enforce, Promoter Jim Coffroth pulled off a scheduled 25 round bout between Jim Hagen and Eddie Fagan in his Colma arena today.

The fight was not stopped by Sheriff Robert Chatham of San Mateo county. It was stopped by Hagen at the end of one minute of fighting, when he knocked Fagan out with a stiff right to the jaw.

Sheriff Chatham, at the direction of the district attorney, was just climbing into the ring to make his arrests, when the fight was finished with a knockout. Promptly at 10 o'clock the two fighters entered the ring. Gregory Mitchell, referee, began to mix it. The fight was fast and furious for just 60 seconds, when Hagen laid his opponent low with a heavy right.

Sheriff Chatham arrested the two principals and took the boxing gloves and other paraphernalia as evidence. Chatham put his prisoners in Coffroth's machine and the party proceeded to Redwood City.

Hagen and Fagan were arraigned before Justice of the Peace James Hannon in Redwood City on a charge of having violated section 412 of the penal code. Hannon wanted the prisoners' bail fixed at \$500 each.

Instead of furnishing the bail asked by the justice of the court, Coffroth's attorney, Frank J. Burke, went before Superior Judge George H. Buck and was granted a writ of habeas corpus, returnable at 10 o'clock Saturday. Judge Buck fixed the bail at \$100 each, which was immediately paid by Promoter Coffroth.

In speaking of Bullock's attempt to stop the fights, Attorney Burke said today: "Bullock is merely making a political move. For five years he has wanted these fights to be held, and now he discovers a law preventing the holding of the contests. He hopes to get into the good graces of the voters by making this political grandstand play."

Beals Wright May Head Otis Going After More Tennis Team

NEW YORK, May 23.—The recent sudden departure of Beals C. Wright for England has focused the attention of American tennis players on a situation of much uncertainty. Rumors have been persistent that Wright, who will lead any American team that will compete for the Dwight F. GOTCH WILL JOIN JEFF CAMP SOON

BEN LOMOND, May 23.—Frank Gotch, champion wrestler of the world, will join the Jeffries staff of trainers not later than June 5, according to telegraphic advices received from the wrestler today. Gotch wired that he would start west immediately after his match with Zybyszchko, and this should land him at Ben Lomond not later than the 5th. He will be the last of the additions to the Jeffries training camp, for Jim Corbett will precede him.

JUDGES WILL SIFT SPRING BAN'S WIN

Mare Shows Surprisingly Good Form and Easily Outruns Choices in Fourth

When Rosamo was excused from the last race at Emeryville on the strength of the report of the track veterinarian that he was lame, the announcement came as an unpleasant surprise to the layers who had quoted 6 to 5 against Lord of the Forest and taken numerous wagers at that price. With Rosamo out 2 to 5 was laid against Lord of the Forest, while money wagered on the Crane horse was ordered refunded, as George Smith, who has charge of the advance information, had not given the "all weighed" signal, which is his custom before each race. When the jockey board is raised to its position and the announcement is made all bets made after that stand.

A number of big bettors wagered on Lord of the Forest as soon as speculation began and they profited to a considerable extent through the difference in prices, as Gabriel's sprinter was returned winner.

Another runup followed the victory of John Louis, his price being advanced from \$40 to \$705 by James Neil. The stable also retained him. Tremargo set the pace in the race, but John Louis caught him easily the final sixteenth. The well played Anne McGee lost all chances by getting away badly.
