EAST IS MISLED ON HETCH HETCHY

Berkeley Commissioner Says Sierra Water Project Will Not Be Opposed

BERKELEY, June 6.—That most of the easterners will favor the Hetch Hetchy water project when they know the facts was the statement of Commissioner Wilbur F. McClure of this city, who is again at his desk in the city hall after five weeks spent in the east.

"The people of the east," said McClure this morning, "do not know the facts in the Hetch Hetchy matter, and hence have formed ideas of the project on hearsay. When they are educated as to the true state of affairs, they will undoubtedly be on our side. The outlook for securing the Sierra water looks exceedingly bright."

McClure spent considerable time in the eastern cities studying fenders, incinerators and other improvements which may be of use here. He was surprised by the great number of miles of improved streets in the eastern cities as compared to Berkeley, and declared that the people here should spend more money for permanent streets.

CHERRY FESTIVAL TO OPEN FRIDAY NIGHT

San Leandro Begins Decorating for Annual Fete

SAN LEANDRO, June 6.—With the stringing of flags and banners across the principal business streets and the erection of a high arch on Estudillo avenue near Hayward avenue, San Leandro today began active preparations for the three days' annual cherry festival, which is to open next Friday night. Tomorrow, electricians will begin the stringing of thousands of incandescents across the streets and on the arch, which will be one mass of lights.

A large force of men also started work on cleaning up the city. Weeds will be cleared away from the edge of the sidewalks and the vacant lots will be made to look as attractive as possible. Nearly all the vacant property will be occupied by various attractions and booths, for Chairman C. Q. Rideout of the concessions committee has received more demands for space than he cares to fill.

Property owners, as well as the businessmen, are preparing to decorate extensively in honor of the festival. At present the largest private homes on Estudillo, Hayward, San Lorenzo, Juana and Joaquin avenues and the foothill boulevard, plans are being made to entertain large parties. MAYOR DISCUSSES WATER MATTERS

Alameda Executive Confers With Representatives of the Bay Cities Company

ALAMEDA, June 6.—Mayor W. H. Noy with City Engineer L. N. Chapman and City Attorney M. W. Simpson conferred today with Manager C. E. Gillman and Assistant Manager Leo R. Dickey of the Bay Cities company relative to a recent proposition made the city council and the mayor by President W. S. Tevis of the Bay Cities company to supply water to Alameda.

Mayor Noy informed the water company's representatives that he did not believe the plan to have the city vote nearly \$800,000 bonds for the purpose of installing a municipal water distributing system, the water to be supplied by the Bay Cities company, would meet with general approval for the reason that the city recently voted \$180,000 for school and sewer improvements and that a further bond issue would result in an increase in the tax rate.

Mayor Noy let it be understood that he was in favor of an abundant and pure supply of water and that the officials of Alameda thought well of the quality of the water in the shed of the Bay Cities company in the vicinity of Mount Hamilton, from which, it is said, the company intends to supply the east bay communities.

The mayor said that he thought that if the Bay Cities company would install its own distributing system here and supply pure water that the residents of Alameda would lend the company strong support in the way of approving the water question is expected to be further discussed at the meeting of the city council tomorrow night, when the report of Engineers L. N. Chapman and A. L. Bannister on their inspection of the water shed of the Bay Cities company will be made.

CHINESE HELD FOR ROBBERY—Oakland, June 6.—Chin Sing, a Chinese, who has confessed to the robbery of a \$200 bill, was held in the home of Kim Yuen at 356 Eighth street, May 26, and stole \$96 and \$40 worth of cotton, was held over to the superior court by Police Judge Smith this morning on a charge of robbery. Chin Sing's bond was fixed at \$3,000.

COUNTY NOT LIABLE—Oakland, June 6.—The county of Alameda has not let anything by the sale of the large vacant lot, according to District Attorney Donahue. It is not liable to the Pauly jail construction company for \$1,057 of any. Donahue says, for the iron that was sold by the supervisors for \$90. The Pauly company said it could have used the iron in the new jail.

EMPLOYEES AROUND THE REFINERY BELIEVE THAT CURRY HAS MET WITH FOUL PLAY.

RICHMOND, June 6.—Sheriff Veale of Contra Costa county has issued a circular in which he states that \$200 is offered for information leading to the location of David Curry of Richmond, who mysteriously disappeared May 15, after receiving his salary from the field office of the Standard oil company.

The theory that Curry fell into one of the big cisterns at the refinery, which is the official of the company have pointed out the impossibility of any one's getting inside a tank without opening a trap door some distance from the cistern.

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WOMAN WITH GUN THREATENS SHERIFF

Crippled Ark Dweller Resists Eviction, but Is Disarmed by Deputies

ALAMEDA, June 6.—Armed with a double barreled shotgun Mrs. J. W. Pierson, wife of an ark dweller at the east end, threatened and defied Sheriff Frank Barnett and four of his deputies when they went to the dwelling this morning to evict the Pierson family and put J. K. Kearney in possession of the premises, Kearney having secured title to the property, which was claimed by Pierson under squatter rights.

The woman, who is a cripple and forced to go about on crutches, poked her shotgun out of a window as the officers approached. She said that she would kill any man who tried to enter the ark. Sheriff Barnett read the order from the court directing him to place Kearney in possession of the property. While he was doing this two of his deputies forced a door in the back of the dwelling, entered and secured the shotgun. Mrs. Pierson was commanded to leave the ark and she obeyed. The deputy sheriffs assisted by a number of spectators to the extent that they carried all of the furnishings of the ark home of the Piersons out and piled them on land adjoining the strip to which Kearney had been given possession.

Pierson appeared at her home this morning and was told that her family had been evicted and her household goods moved. He declared that he would make a legal fight to regain possession of the land.
