HINDU OF HIGH CASTE SENT TO SAN QUENTIN

Seven Years Term for Crime of Robbery

AUBURN, June 15.—K. P. R. Singh, a Hindu of high caste, who since November, 1908, has been trying to clear himself of a charge of robbery, which resulted in his conviction, must serve his sentence of seven years in San Quentin, according to a decree of the supreme court denying his final appeal. THOROUGHbred CATTLE HAVE TEXAS FEVER

Carload of Herefords to Be Quarantined All Summer

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, June 15.—A carload of thoroughbred Hereford heifers was discovered at Gal, yesterday infected with the dreaded Texas fever tick. Dr. Charles Keane, state veterinarian, went at once to the scene and thoroughly disinfected the car, cattle and contents. All summer long the heifers will be kept in a special quarantine pasture. The stock was consigned to Need Brothers, having been shipped from the Diamond land company's range near Porterville. This shipment was in violation of the law and Dr. Keane has dispatched an officer to investigate and make arrests where necessary.

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MRS. A. B. WRIGHT CLAIMED BY DEATH

Mrs. A. B. Wright, only daughter of Chief Justice W. H. Beatty of the supreme court, died yesterday afternoon at the home of her father, 2409 Octavia street. Her death was a sudden shock to numerous friends in this city, who believed that she had partly recuperated during her stay in Hawaii. Accompanied by her father, Mrs. Wright returned from Honolulu on the steamer Sierra Tuesday. She was taken ill on the voyage and on the arrival of the steamer was taken in an ambulance to a private hospital. Mrs. Wright was born in Nevada 21 years ago and brought to this state when 1 year old. For many years she attended private school in San Francisco. Besides the chief justice, Mrs. Wright is survived by her brother, H. O. Beatty, a local attorney, and two sons: William B. and Sheldon S. Wright. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.
