McCarthy Believes Congress Will Indorse Project at the Next Session

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with a year to show the government engineers what was needed and what could be done with the Hetch Hetchy supply, the prospects were promising.

In speaking of his trip and what had been accomplished he said: "San Francisco has, I believe, won the fight for the fair. If we make the showing that congress has asked for I am certain we will get the support of that body. In fact, I think most of the country is with us, and with the time allowed to carry on the campaign for support it seems almost within our grasp."

"We have carried the battle right up to the big men and have achieved splendid results. The merchants of San Francisco have left no doubts in the minds of the easterners that they mean to have the exposition here and the way of enthusiasm seems to have caught thousands of Californians who are traveling across the land, north and south, east and west."

"Everywhere I went I heard about the fair, and where I didn't hear I let them be assured that the Panama-Pacific exposition will be a reality."

Status of Hetch Hetchy

"We should feel gratified at the condition of the fight for the Hetch Hetchy water supply. With a year to demonstrate its virtues to the army engineers who have been delegated to report on it I am sure we can secure this invaluable possession to ourselves and posterity in San Francisco."

"The statement made by James D. Melan that our interests were safe with a permit from the secretary of the interior is absurd. While one secretary might grant us the right, another might revoke it, and we would be constantly at the mercy of some official caprice. We need an act of congress to secure this to us. President Taft and I talked the matter over, and he agreed that that was the only safe way for the people of San Francisco to proceed. I believe that Hetch Hetchy and the fair loom up before us in San Francisco as immediate possibilities and feel satisfied with what has been accomplished in both matters."

"I can not discuss the prize fight situation at all. I was absolutely misquoted in Chicago and have already taken steps to force a retraction. There was no possible excuse for quoting me as I was quoted, and I have five reputable businessmen of Chicago, who were present at the interview, who will bear me out in what I say. It was a malicious attempt to place me in a ridiculous position before the people of the country. I have at all times refused to discuss the fight situation and will continue to do so."

"I have don't ask me to say anything about the Flannery matter. I can not discuss that now with anybody. Absolutely nothing will be done until I have had an opportunity to investigate matters to my own satisfaction. I will rest at home for a few days, and, my foot permitting, will endeavor to get in touch with municipal affairs within a week."

"The mayor declared that his health was splendid and that he had enjoyed his trip immensely. He was treated hospitably by municipal authorities, labor men and citizens, wherever he stopped. 'But there is no place in the United States like California,' he said."

Production in Original Tongue Part of Closing Exercises in Menlo Park

The closing exercises of St. Patrick's seminary in Menlo Park this year, scheduled to take place June 23, will be unique and interesting. The principal feature will be the staging of "The Captives" in the original Latin. This play, which is one of the best of the comedies written by Plautus, was selected several months ago for production by the members of the rhetoric class, and the whole student body embraced the idea with enthusiasm. At the time their intention was to give it on the patronal feast of the seminary, but in order to devote more time to preparation and insure a more finished performance, they decided to wait until commencement day.

CLASSIC SETTING PROVIDED
A temporary stage following closely the measurements of the old Roman stages, has been built in the gymnasium attached to the seminary and everything is in readiness for the public performance. The scenery, which is the same throughout the piece, shows the exterior of a wealthy Grecian home, and minute attention has been paid to the details of architecture.

This same idea is carried out in the costumes, which are modeled strictly on the old Grecian lines, following the classical requirements of the Greek comedies, or "fabulae palliatae," as they are called from the cloak or pallium worn by the actors. The students have been enabled to carry out the idea through the assistance of Miss M.


