Bakers' union No. 24 met in its hall last Saturday night. The difficulty with the American bakery was reported as settled and the boycott will be withdrawn at the next meeting of the labor council.

Wages Increased WINNIPEG, Man., June 20.—It was announced at the headquarters of the Canadian Pacific railway here today that the wages of all the telegraphers on the system had been increased 45 cents a month.

Shorter Hours Granted SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 20.—The management of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad has granted an advance in salaries to all telegraphers on the road amounting to about 5 per cent, and has also granted considerable concessions in the way of shorter hours.

8 Hour Day Demanded SEATTLE, June 20.—Officers of the teamsters' union have notified employers that a demand is about to be made for an eight hour day without reduction of wages from the 10 hour scale and employment of none but union men.

Pressmen Meet COLUMBUS, O., June 20.—Two hundred and fifty delegates to the international printing pressmen's union of North America were present at the opening session today. The convention will be in session until Friday.

WOMAN ACCUSED OF DEFRAUDING HOTEL

Mrs. Helen E. Augustine of Salt Lake City

Mrs. Helen E. Augustine appeared in Police Judge Weller's court yesterday on a charge of defrauding the proprietor of the Hotel Harcourt out of \$12.50.

Mrs. Augustine denied that she was a "hotel beat" and said that she was a victim of circumstances. She is the divorced wife of Doctor Root of Salt Lake City, and after the divorce she took the name of her first husband, who is dead.

"I came here," she said, "on April 8 with a Mrs. Cecil Parker, whom I met in Salt Lake City, and we intended to go to Manila to start in the millinery business. We put up at the Fairmont hotel, where we remained for a short time, then we went to the Palace. There Mrs. Parker took all of our available funds and disappeared. I had to leave the Palace owing a bill of \$118, but they held as security gowns and other personal property valued at \$3,000.

"Then I went to the Harcourt, where I stopped for two days. While there I went over to Oakland to see a friend and on the boat got acquainted with a young girl who was taking her father to a sanatorium. The girl asked me to assist her, and I did so, going to the sanatorium with her, and she paid me for my services. I sent a check to the Hotel Harcourt for \$8 thinking that was the amount I was owing and was surprised when I went back there to be placed under arrest.

"I have used whatever other money I got in cashing friends' money. I send me funds to pay off my indebtedness here and expect a favorable reply any moment. I have property there."
