MAJOR AND HIS TO DISCUSS WATER Alameda Executive Wants Option Extended and Private Contracts More Explicit

ALAMEDA, June 26.—Mayor William H. Noy has invited President William S. Tevis and Manager C. E. Gilman of the Bay Cities water company to confer with him and the public utilities committee of the city council in his office in the city hall tomorrow.

The city council has not passed upon the form of private contract. This, the mayor believes, should be done.

The offer of Tevis to give the municipality a two year option on the distributing system he may put in has not yet come before the city council, although it was read at a citizens' meeting Wednesday night.

Mayor Noy, City Attorney M. W. Simpson and Councilman William Hammond recently met with Manager Gilman to discuss the question of increasing the time of the option to 10 years.

No definite understanding was reached and it was decided to hold a conference with President Tevis and Manager Gilman on Wednesday.

"It is my desire," said Mayor Noy, in speaking of the Bay Cities water company's project, "to have the people understand the matter, for they will have to decide the question."


