Former President Declares He Did Not Urge Governor to Be Candidate Again

Crowds Greet Returned African Hunter With Cheers as He Travels to Beverly

through parts of Lynn; Swampscott and Salem, and in each of these places the colonel was quickly recognized and cheered. He and Senator Lodge rode in a closed car, but the crowds could see him through the window and he was constantly compelled to lift his hat in recognition of greetings.

At the entrance of the Taft grounds a crowd of a hundred or more persons had gathered. The secret service lipes, usually drawn about the Taft cottage alone, were extended today to the entrance to the entire Burgess Point section, fully a quarter of a mile away.

President Taft was sitting in the library going over the mail with Assistant Secretary Forster when he heard the "honk, honk" of the lodge automobile out in front. He dropped everything and hurried to the porch. Colonel Roosevelt was out of the machine in a moment, and as the two men met their arms unconsciously went toward each other and their hands rested upon each other's shoulders.

CONFER TOGETHER It was some time before the embrace was interrupted. Then President Taft warmly greeted Senator Lodge. Secretary Norton joined the party and Assistant Secretary Forster also was included in the circle.

What of politics entered into the conversation, what words of reminiscence, what exchange of experiences during the last 16 months no one on the veranda other than the two friends themselves knows.

There were so many peals of laughter, so many slaps upon the back, so much of cordiality that it was apparent that there had been no suggestion of a conflict of views.

Roosevelt, when asked if he would visit Beverly again, replied: "I don't know that I shall."

CURRY MORE CONFIDENT THAN BEFORE

Gubernatorial Candidate Guest at Big Smoker Given in His Honor

Tom Keogh, After Visit to the South, Declares Johnson Only Serious Contender

Charles F. Curry, republican candidate for governor, was in San Francisco yesterday and was the guest last night of the Charles F. Curry republican club at a smoker given in his honor in Lyric hall, Larkin street.

Curry returned to the city even more optimistic and enthusiastic over the chance of winning the republican nomination than he was when last here two weeks ago.

Tom Keogh, manager of Curry's campaign, and State Senator Dick Smith, who is interested in Curry's fight, also returned from the 10 days' trip through the southern part of the state and reported that they were more than satisfied with the conditions which they found. According to both of them the pretended Anderson boom is a fizzle of the sortiest kind and Phil Stanton's loudly heralded claim of a "solid south" is a ridiculous political myth.

PARKER LIVING LION Walter Parker, the old machine lieutenant, who is the recognized head, front and body of the Anderson campaign in the south, has yet to come to the front with anything tangible.

Curry has made no positive move in Anderson's behalf, though there has been a rumor current in Los Angeles and vicinity that he would show signs of activity "after the fourth of July."

Tom Keogh declared yesterday that while he had always counted upon a strong Curry sentiment in the south he had been cheerfully surprised to find conditions as they are. Both he and Welch agreed that the only man who needed to be considered in the running at all was Johnson.

He admitted that they found considerable Johnson strength in the states they visited, but said that from the best indications they could find Curry would pull out the winner by a good margin throughout the south.

ALL CLAIM KERN COUNTY Kern county is one of those problem districts which every candidate seems to consider his own particular hunting ground.

WILL ELIMINATE BOSSISM "We found in the south, just as we have found everywhere else, that Curry is recognized as a candidate who has made his contest along direct, proper lines, and as the spirit of the direct primary law intends a fight should be made.

Curry was given an enthusiastic reception and a big ovation at the Hungarian club smoker last evening. Lyric hall was crowded and an entertaining program was presented, including a number of vaudeville acts from the local theaters and by the best amateur performers in the city.

REEF MAY RETURN TO COUNTY JAIL

Judge Lawlor Orders Boodler to Appear Before Court Tomorrow

Reported Improvement in Health May Result in Curtailment of Liberty

Abbe Reef may have to return to the county jail Saturday night and there take up his residence pending determination of his appeal. Judge Lawlor of his own motion yesterday cited the big boodler to appear in court at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning and show cause why he should not be remanded to the custody of the sheriff.

Reef has been at liberty since December 2, 1909, on \$300,000 bail. Judge Cabaniss having opened the doors of the county jail to him during the absence from the state of Judge Lawlor. The convicted bribe giver had at that time been in custody almost a year, having been convicted December 10, 1908.

THE GROUNDS upon which Reef based his petition to be admitted to bail were that he was in ill health, that members of his family were sick, and that he required time and opportunity to confer with his attorneys in preparing the bill of exceptions upon which his appeal was to be taken.

When Judge Lawlor returned to the state at the end of last year, he learned that in his absence Reef had been admitted to bail but refused to make any statement as to his views on the matter. The order to show cause signed yesterday is the grounds of the judge's decision.

RESUME OF PROCEEDINGS It appearing that the indictment in the above entitled cause was presented and filed in said superior court on March 26, 1909; that the defendant pleaded not guilty; that on June 25, 1909, there was a trial upon the trial of the general issue the jury, on December 10, 1909, returned a verdict of guilty, and that the defendant was sentenced to a term of 14 years in the state prison.

HISTORY OF REEF'S APPEAL And it further appearing that on December 29, 1909, an appeal was taken by the defendant from the order and judgment of the superior court of appeal, in and for the first appellate district; that on March 26, 1908, assigned to department 11 of the superior court for hearing and determination, and that the Hon. William P. Lawlor, judge of the department, presided over the proceedings;
