OFFICERS OF SCHOOL BOARDS Board of Education and Councilmen Estimate Cost at Three Millions

OAKLAND, July 14.—The board of education in conference with the special bond committee of the city council has fixed \$3,420,000 as the amount of money to be raised by the sale of bonds for the erection of new schools and the purchase of additional sites in the annexed district and in the old city. The question of procedure in calling a bond election was referred to the city attorney, who will determine whether the school board should call a district election, or whether the council should take charge of the bond proposition as a municipal project.

The original estimate by the school board of the money needed was \$2,350,000. At the conference several additional items, such as larger playgrounds and improvements to existing buildings, were taken up, and the conference decided that all were necessary to the proper development of the department.


BORLE STANDS UP FOR CITY ADMINISTRATION Resigns From Improvement Club Committees

COLE'S BROTHERS OPPOSE WILLS Mother's Disposition of Her Fortune Pleases Whole Family Except One Son

OAKLAND, July 14.—William R. Cole's two brothers, Henry and Charles, declared themselves opposed to his contest of his mother's will when they appeared in Judge Wells' court today, in spite of the fact that they would benefit greatly if the will should be declared invalid. Henry and Charles Cole said that they were satisfied with the arrangement made by their mother, the late Mary P. Cole, whereby their sisters, Kate and Lillian Cole, were given the bulk of an estate worth about \$100,000.

The sisters testified that the estate involved had little value, as Mrs. Cole transferred most of her property and deeds and indorsement of bank stock before her death. Some of the deeds were recorded and some were not. Her daughters were given property in Twelfth street, near Jefferson, Oakland; a home in College avenue, Berkeley; real estate in San Francisco worth about \$1,500 and 23 shares of stock of the Oakland bank of savings, the total being worth between \$20,000 and \$100,000.

Judge Wells refused today to appoint William R. Cole special administrator of the estate, as he had requested. He continued the matter of the contest of the will until August 2.
