

Fast Yacht Hawaii Looks to Have Edge on Rivals in Ocean Race

CRISIS REACHED IN BOXING SITUATION

Fate of Ten Round Bouts Will Decide Future of Sport Here

THE boxing game in San Francisco has about reached the crisis. The promoters, managers and fighters are treading on the quicksands now.

There is no question that the promoters must put on their kid gloves and deal their cards gingerly and carefully.

It remains to be seen how the fight followers of this city will warm up to the 10 round no decision game.

Apparently the 10 round game is the very game for Los Angeles. It has been in vogue there for one and a half years, and they report progress every time a battle is staged.

LOCAL FANS ARE USED TO ACTION

But there is as much difference between Los Angeles and San Francisco as there is between Lake Merritt and the Pacific ocean.

The fans of San Francisco have been used to witnessing real contests—fights, in other words—for many years past.

It is a noteworthy fact that there is more real fighting on the program of one of these semiprofessional four round attractions each month than one generally sees in a real so-called "brutal fight."

ALL FAKERS SHOULD BE BARRED

But when the authorities frown upon the sport and order out the militia there is nothing for the promoters to do but bow to the inevitable.

Now that the managers of the various clubs are ready to go ahead with their 10 round contests they may as well start with a new and a clean slate.

And while they are abiding by the law let them see to it that no unscrupulous boxers or ace in the hole managers put over any shady transactions on them.

It is up to the promoters now to weed out all suspicious fighters and crooked managers. This word of warning should go a long route with all of them.

Jim Griffin is off to a good start in his effort to do his share toward bringing the game back. In Lew Powell and Frankie Burns he has signed up a pair of clever, clean fighters, who should fight their coming battle well within the law and at the same time give the fans an interesting exhibition of skill and defense, without a suggestion of the rough stuff.

But Powell must have the call over the youngster for the reason that he is more experienced. Experience counts in the boxing game just as it does in every other line of business.

Few of the fans look for a knockout in the next battle. Neither man is a knocker out. Both are of the clever sect, and when two clever men hook up it's generally a case of jab and duck and glide away and come in again.

But Coffroth probably has some motive, some scheme which he intends to work out. He says that he has not been notified to resign his plans, and so long as things keep breaking for him as they have been breaking Coffroth intends to go right ahead with his plan of campaign.
