

BAD CHECKS AND WIDOW CAUSE FALL

Old Man Meets Pretty Woman and Lavishes Money Until Paper Returns "N. G."

Samuel P. Bowen, 64 years of age, is in trouble. While coming to this city on a steamer from Los Angeles he met a pretty widow, Mrs. Catherine Raymond, 40 years of age, and when they reached this city they went to the St. Francis hotel on June 12, where they registered as Mr. and Mrs. Samuel P. Bowen. They remained at the hotel till July 2, and Bowen paid his bill of \$75 with a check on the Arizona consolidated bank of Tucson, and yesterday the police were notified by the hotel management that the check was fictitious.

After leaving the St. Francis hotel and Mrs. Raymond went to a lodging house at 214 Sixth street kept by Mrs. A. Hayes. There he met from J. Coleman and gave him a check for the amount on the same bank, and he also gave Mrs. Hayes a check for \$15 for board and lodging, both of which were returned as worthless. Coleman notified the police and swore to a warrant on Tuesday for Bowen's arrest on a charge of passing a fictitious check, and he was arrested by Detectives Cahill and Peal. He appeared before Police Judge Conlan yesterday and the case was continued till tomorrow. The St. Francis hotel management will also swear to a complaint against him. Bowen says he is a merchant from Arizona, but the police are inclined to doubt the truth of his statement, and are looking up his record. Thrown upon her own resources, Mrs. Raymond is now employed as a waitress in a restaurant in Sixth street.

BIBLE QUOTED TO UPHOLD BEATING

Holy Rollers' Interpretation of Scriptures Fails to Impress Jurymen

SAN JOSE, July 27.—After being out for but a few minutes the jury in the case of William Oberther, charged with battery in beating and otherwise mistreating two little nephews to make them conform to the belief and practices of his sect, the "Holy Rollers," brought in a verdict of guilty and recommended that he be punished to the full extent of the law.

Oberther in his defense read from the Scriptures, wherein the beating of the heathen to make them accept the faith was allowed, as he interpreted it. Several members of the floor of the clerk's office, after being shown from the courtroom, and it took the united efforts of the bailiff and the clerk to get her up and out of the building.

Oberther will be sentenced tomorrow. Mrs. Theodore Wilde, also charged with battery and mistreatment of the children, will come up for trial.
