

SMELTER COMPANY SUES FOR DAMAGES

Selby People Defendants in an Action to Recover the Sum of \$1,730,411

South San Francisco Land and Improvement Co. Alleges Breach of Contract

Suit for \$1,730,411.24 damages for alleged failure to observe a contract to erect a smelter plant, railroad track and dock facilities at San Bruno point, in San Mateo county, was begun in the superior court yesterday by the South San Francisco land and improvement company against the Selby smelting and land company.

The agreement between the two corporations was entered into February 15, 1906, with a supplemental agreement made the same year. The smelter company at first undertook to purchase 100 acres of 110 lands and 100 acres of upland, for \$66,500, but the amended agreement provided for the purchase of 112 acres of hard land and 40 acres of tide lands, the price fixed being unchanged. It was recited in the agreement that the smelter company should erect a railroad to connect with the railroad of the land company, and that there would be permanent interchange of traffic over the two tracks.

The land company on its part undertook to bind the purchasers of land in the 2,500 acre tract not to object to the gases or fumes from the smelter plant, and to extend its railroad and water main. These provisions of the contract it has observed to the letter. The corporation, spending \$3,465 on the water system, \$6,000 in extending the railroad, besides paying out \$5,788 in removing tenants from the land proposed to be occupied by the smelter company.

In accordance with the contract the land company in October, 1906, delivered to the smelting company a deed in the land covered by the agreement. The defendant corporation did not, it is complained, erect the promised plant within 18 months, and has now entirely abandoned the enterprise.

SPECIAL SESSION WILL BE HELD SOON

GILLETT BILL MAY CAUSE A PROTEST

Executive Committee of San Francisco's Retirement Association to Discuss Measure

The executive committee of the San Francisco branch of the United States civil service retirement association will hold an important meeting at the Appraisers' building tomorrow evening to consider the protest against the contributory plan of retirement for the superannuated employees known as the Gillett bill, now pending in congress.

It is contended that the contributory plan does not express the idea of the majority of the employees of the government. The scheme is considered inadequate because it means a reduction of the present salaries of the employees, amounting to approximately from \$5 to \$15 a month on every \$100 salary.

COLORADO SOLONS BOUND BY PLEDGE

Initiative and Referendum Bills Will Probably Pass

DENVER, Aug. 17.—Nineteen democratic senators, constituting a majority of the senate, each bound by a written pledge to vote for measures determined upon by the majority of the caucus, today agreed upon the terms of the initiative and referendum measure to be placed before the senate.

The bill, as agreed upon today provides that legislation may be initiated by the people upon a petition signed by not less than 15 per cent of the total vote cast for governor at the last preceding election.
