

CARPENTERS WILL BUILD LABOR TEMPLE

San Mateo County Union Plans to Erect Fine Temple Immediately

Edited by O. M. BOYLE. The carpenters' union No. 1913 of Vista Grande, San Mateo county, is about to erect a labor temple. The Union Men's hall association, composed of members of the union, was incorporated August 5. The building will be 57x106 feet, at the corner of Melrose and Market streets. The capital stock is \$25,000, in 25,000 shares. The lot is already purchased and the structure will shortly be erected. J. P. Pankewicz is president of the corporation, and the board of directors is composed of five members. Twenty thousand shares of the stock is to remain in the hands of union men. The remaining 5,000 may be sold to the general public. No individual or organization can control more than 5,000 shares.

A. J. Gallagher and several other labor leaders returned from Los Angeles yesterday and reported everything encouraging for a final settlement of the strike. Judge Maguire and his legal conferees are optimistic that the higher courts will declare the recent anti-striking ordinance unconstitutional. Already a marked change is noted in the attitude of the judges toward the strikers.

Nothing will be given out by the general campaign strike committee as to the action of the State brewers' association, but it is more than probable that the result of the affair between the association and the county workers in Los Angeles will be made known before the week is gone.

Louis Spinou was chosen delegate to the labor council at the last meeting of cooks' helpers' union No. 110. The local will not be in the great parade. Seventeen candidates were obligated and 15 applications received.

At the last meeting of carpenters' union No. 484, E. C. Evans was elected a delegate to the bay counties district council of carpenters and J. Ryan was chosen vice president, vice P. W. Gillett, resigned.

At the Wednesday night meeting of the bay counties district council of carpenters a committee of five was appointed to formulate plans to regulate apprentices. Favorable reports from Stockton, Alameda and San Mateo were received. The council will make up a division in the labor day parade. President J. Burns is making all necessary arrangements for the parade. Signatures to the petition for an amendment to raise the wages of laborers from \$2.00 to \$3 per day are being rapidly obtained and the necessary number will shortly be secured.

Eleven additions were made to the roster Wednesday night by waiters' union No. 36. Contributions were made to aid a member in distress and the local executive committee. Business was reported as improving.

Daniel Tattenham, Henry Hilker and O. B. Weilsburger were appointed a committee at the last meeting of barbers' union No. 147 to make all necessary arrangements for the labor day parade. A final report will be made at the next meeting. A fine of \$2.50 will be imposed on all members not in line on the day of the parade.

Structural iron workers' union No. 78 has elected J. J. McCormick marshal for the labor day parade, and the aids will be announced at the following meeting on Wednesday night and general instruction where to form for the parade. Aids will be announced at this meeting.

Milk wagon drivers' union No. 225 met Wednesday night and decided to try and unionize the Ingleside dairy. The union states that many small dairies in the city are trying to evade union conditions by taking in employees as partners upon the payment of a nominal sum. Each of these cases is to be thoroughly investigated.

Machinists' lodge No. 65 is making arrangements to have its 1,000 members in line. Each will be given a badge with the right hours printed upon it. The lodge made the usual donations to the commissary fund. A benefit will be given at night at the Excelsior hall, corner Mission and Onondaga streets, the proceeds to go to a disabled member of the lodge.

Butchers' union No. 1, at its weekly meeting, sent out postal cards to all proprietors of meat markets and pork stores notifying them to be closed at 9 o'clock, but will be closed at the following day, Admission day. Eight candidates were initiated. The usual weekly Los Angeles assessment was paid. The local donated \$5 to the benefit for a member of painters' union No. 19, who is losing his eyesight.

At the meeting Tuesday night of the machinists' lodge No. 294, \$300 was donated to the strikers in the north and \$100 to the Los Angeles men who are fighting for an eight hour day. Three candidates were obligated and five applications received. After the business meeting a smoking high jinks entertained the members for several hours.

Building trades council held a short session last night but no routine business was transacted. A telegram was received from O. A. Twitmore in Los Angeles stating that the strike situation is improving. In the absence of Twitmore, A. E. Smith acted as secretary.

The business agents made their usual reports upon conditions existing in San Francisco and the bay counties.
