PLUMBER HELD TO HIS LOW BIDDING

Playgrounds Committee Refuses to Allow Him to Withdraw His Contract

A contractor in the plumbing line presented a bid to the playgrounds commission yesterday to do certain work at the North Beach grounds, but after it was accepted discovered that it was nearly a half less than those of other bidders and at once brought the telephone into play to say that he had bid for only part of the work, but this did not avail him, for the commission declared that he must do the work or forfeit his check amounting to \$59.80.

The contract was awarded to M. Levy to install lavatories in the girls' section of the North Beach playground for \$59.80, as against \$100 offered by two other bidders. Subsequently Levy notified the commission that his bid is only for the plumbing.

This looks as if Levy wants to back out now that he discovered that his bid is so much lower than that of the others," said one of the commissioners. It was stated that Levy had bid according to the advertisement which accompanied the bid, and that if he did not want to carry out his bid the commission would forfeit his certified check.

Ray Doherty was elected director of play at the South Side grounds at a salary of \$100 per month. Doherty was questioned as to his qualifications for the position, and among other things was asked, "What experience have you had with the gang?" "Considerable," replied Doherty. "My idea is that some one should get on top of it and keep it down."

DEAN ADDRESSES COMMISSION

Dean addressed the commission in relation to the Madison playgrounds in Clay street near Walnut, urging that it should not be fitted up as are the other grounds, but that it should be arranged in an artistic manner as a place for nurse girls and babies, and have only a tennis lawn, without a gymnasium or swinging rings and the like.

The commission announced that the suggestion would be taken under consideration. Playground Director Schlitter stated that he had completed arrangements for the informal opening of the South Side playgrounds September 1, and the formal opening on Saturday, September 24. He stated that the installing of 100 lockers at these grounds would cost \$500. Also that he was arranging a program for the playgrounds during the Admission day festival.
