COLLEGES PUT UP BASEBALL BARS

Santa Clara and St. Mary's Players Must Get Out of Three C League

Santa Clara and St. Mary's have joined hands in placing the ban on the Three C league, as far as the players of the respective colleges are concerned. This will strike hard at the managers of Salinas, Watsonville, San Jose and Gilroy, all of whom have one or more of these college men listed in their lineups.

For some weeks past trouble has been brewing in the league. The season's play was divided, Salinas winning the first half easily, with Watsonville leading handily in the second. At Salinas the grass was getting closely cropped, as San Jose, Monterey, Gilroy and Santa Cruz proved poor cards and the home players in consequence were perceptibly listless in the field.

Joe and Gilroy, however, figured that their chances for success in the second season series were good. The proposed scheme, therefore, that Salinas, admittedly the strongest team, hand its three final scheduled games with Watsonville to the latter club, and that Salinas and Watsonville immediately engage in a final championship series, started a mild riot throughout the remaining weeks in the circuit. Meanwhile the five game series between Watsonville and Salinas was announced and dates set.

The other managers got to work, however, and yesterday's dispatches proclaimed that all was harmony once more. Just what specific action was taken by these managers is not clear. Watsonville and Salinas are carded to begin their championship series at Watsonville on next Sunday.

Yesterday the St. Mary's players were told in no uncertain terms that the heretofore dead letter rule between Santa Clara and St. Mary's relative to summer baseball would positively go into immediate effect. This rule prohibits any regular student of either college to play on a team other than one representing his own institution after October 1.

Salinas will, therefore, have to disband after next Sunday's game, as it is made up nearly in toto of St. Mary's players. St. Mary's, Fitzsimmons, Leonard, Wilkinson, Gluzal, Wallace, Leonard, Wilcox and Hart. The two last having completed their course at college are not included in the ruling. The only other player on the Salinas lineup is Peters, a Santa Clara boy.

Portland Asks Continuous Ball Next Year

PORTLAND, Sept. 20.—Portland may have continuous baseball next season. So says Judge McCredie on his return from the meeting of the Coast league magnates in San Francisco. McCredie's interview will be published in the Oregonian in the morning. McCredie does not believe an eight team coast league possible, because he will not consent to five teams south and three in the north. He believes the Northwestern league will put a team in Portland next year, but says he does not know who will finance the deal. Walter McCredie insists he will not. McCredie says Ed Walters and Harry Boery are coming north in a week or so to talk Coast league expansion, but he believes their visit will be fruitless.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Sept. 20. The first game of the interclass Rugby series was played here today between the fifteens representing the junior and senior classes. The score at the end of the game stood 8 to 5 in favor of the fourth year men, the result of two tries and a goal. The two lower classes will meet Thursday afternoon, and the victor of this game will meet the seniors next Monday for the 1910 interclass championship.

McDevitt, today became a world's champion race trotter for fillies of her age, when she defeated Dudie Archdale in a grueling race for the Hooper-Columbus stakes, the last \$10,000 prize that the grand circuit has to offer this year. TRACK ACTIVITIES NARROWED DOWN

Only Two Important Events, the Interclass and Cross Country, on Card

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, Sept. 20.—Only two track events of importance will be held on the campus this fall. These will be in the form of an interclass meet on November 3 and a cross country run in the early part of December. Owing to the fact that Trainer Walter Christie is devoting practically all his time to the football squads several old varsity men are coaching the freshmen in the various events. The following have been on hand daily to help the freshmen master the form in their special events:

Captain Donald '11, hurdles and sprints; R. McGee '12, pole vault; E. D. McNear, hammer throw; G. Kretzinger '11 and F. E. Allen '11, broad jumps; B. Norton '11 and S. H. Newell '11, distances; P. J. Levy '12, 440 yard dash, and R. H. Scott '12, shotput and javelin throw. Captain Donald has arranged for a cross country run every Friday afternoon during this term. This weekly run will be in the nature of a practice race for the distance runners of the university, but all other track men who so desire may enter.

Trainer Christie said that the meet would be on the order of the interclass that has been held in the spring terms of former years. He said that the freshman class would be allowed to compete.

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
