



THE importance of beards is greatly underestimated. Some persons do not consider it at all, believing such hirsute decorations as still exist in a comparatively civilized age to be relics of barbarism. This is a mistake. Beards and mustaches have recently been receiving the thoughtful attention of scientific military authorities, and Eleanor Glyn.

First it was Mrs. Glyn who deplored the smooth faces of American men. She said that they all looked alike, and she wearied of their monotony. She didn't advocate distinguishing mustaches for women, however. While Mrs. Glyn's remarks applied to effects in appearance, an Austrian savant approaches the subject more ponderously. He believes beards to be safeguards to health. Nature intended men to wear them to sift the air they breathe, he declares. The nostrils of women are finer than those of men, so they don't need beards, which is a reassuring statement, but men require their protection from germs. The Austrian savant speaks positively and prophetically, concluding that the masculine half of the race will shorten life by shaving. No portrait of this eminent authority accompanied his essay, lately translated in a magazine, but it is easy to imagine him peering at the world "over formidable whiskered ramparts," which is something some one once said of Ibsen. He certainly will take no chances with germs.

Lastly, an officer of the English army concerns himself with mustaches. He has issued an order that those on the faces of noncommissioned officers and men in his regiment at Aldershot must not be waxed. Only generals, colonels, majors and lieutenants may wear the horizontal spikes that are popular abroad. Soldiers must permit their mustaches to droop forlornly, with no sustaining wax. The arbitrary rule, which is much discussed in English army circles, may result in smooth faces in the ranks. It is, altogether, a question of no minor import.

Locally considered, the Van Dyke beard and waxed mustache of Joseph D. Redding is suggested. Mr. Redding's is the most carefully molded mustache in San Francisco. Richard Tobin's is even less so. Colonel Kirkpatrick has no rival in his beard, which would delight the Austrian advocate of hirsute aids to health. And, of course, there is Ned Greenway's mustache, which has an air of careless abandon about it that is delightfully characteristic.

But there are relatively few such as these. The Austrian savant would be horrified at the reckless disregard of germs displayed by San Francisco men, and he probably hasn't an idea that his theory is so unattractive that most men would rather risk them.

Stepchildren Seek Injunction to Prevent Columbia College From Obtaining Million Wives Those of Samuel West's Wife, but Niece Files Contest

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—The right of Columbia college to property worth approximately \$1,000,000 bequeathed to it for a cancer research fund by the late George Crocker, the California millionaire, was attacked today when Crocker's stepchildren applied to the supreme court for an injunction to prevent the executors of the millionaire's will from carrying out the bequest. The executors of the property are pending the determination of an action brought to establish their right to the property. In his will Crocker ordered the sale of a house on East Sixty-fourth street, and the money thus realized to be turned over to Columbia college for a cancer research fund. Alexander H. Rutherford, Alice H. Erving and Ella Rutherford Kearney, Crocker's stepchildren, now sue Nelson C. Threlk, John Hays Hammond and Edgar J. Bradley, as Crocker's executors, for possession of the house in question and its contents on the ground that Crocker secured the deed from them under fraudulent and undue influence and under the promise of a consideration which was never paid to them. In Crocker's testament there was no mention of his stepchildren. The court reserved decision.
