

MAYOR NOY ASKS FOR REFERENDUM

Alameda's Executive Desires Expression on Proposed Purchase of Electric Current

ALAMEDA, Sept. 21.—Mayor William H. Noy is desirous of obtaining public opinion as to the advisability of the city purchasing electric power for use in the daytime from the Great Western power company, and in a statement issued today invited the filing of a petition for a referendum vote on the subject.

The city owns its own electric plant, but the electricity commission is of the opinion that power for the daytime can be purchased cheaper from an outside company than it can be generated at the local plant.

Mayor Noy's statement is as follows: With reference to the ordinance which was passed last evening approving the Great Western power contract with the city, the municipal works will be operated at night as usual, if the power for the daytime is purchased from the outside.

The only objection that I am cognizant of is that it might tend to limit the development of our plant that it would be before the people, which is impossible to get along without outside current.

However, I wish the public to know that the charter of the city of Alameda does not contemplate, in any situation, that the mayor or council should assume entire responsibility.

NAPA MANAGERS SCORE NAT ELLERY

Resolution Adopted by State Hospital Board Is Slap at Engineering Board

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, Sept. 21.—Accepting the new receiving and treatment building at the Napa state hospital because it is immediately required for hospital purposes, although it is far from complete, the board of managers of the Napa institution has passed a resolution that is a slap at the state engineering department and Nat Ellery.

Manager Tom Dozier prepared the resolution which points out that the state could not finish building with the appropriation at hand, a further expenditure of \$12,000 being necessary to complete it.

Engineer Ellery characterizes the "slam" as a piece of sarcasm on the part of the hospital board, because he took the work out of their hands.

The original estimate of cost for this building was \$91,316, says Ellery. The legislature appropriated \$10,000 in making the estimates we figured that the hospital would supply us with considerable insular labor, as Stockton did, but this did not materialize.
