## FREIGHT SHIPPERS HAVE GRIEVANCES

## Oakland Manufacturers Make Complaints Before State Railroad Commissioners

OAKLAND, Sept. 26.—Grievances of local freight shippers occupied the attention of the state railroad commission, which held a session this morning in the headquarters of the Oakland chamber of commerce. Chairman I. C. Irwin of the board presided. Commissioners H. D. Loveland and Theodore Summerland were present, as were Secretary Walter D. Wagner and R. M. Armstrong, official reporter for the commission.

C. B. Matheny, representing the Oakland sash and door company, complained that San Francisco freight shippers had an advantage of 8 cents per 100 pounds over Oakland shippers sending freight to any point on the Northwestern Pacific, except to Santa Rosa. Matheny declared that local shippers are required to pay the additional freight to Tiburon on less than carload lots. Matheny was asked to send a communication to the commission stating his grievance in detail.

Superintendent Parsons of the Judson manufacturing company of Emeryville complained of the charge of \$2.50 a car made by the Southern Pacific company for hauling a car loaded on the switch at the company's works to the main line. Parsons contended that the charge was unjust in view of the fact that the switch tracks had been put in by the Judson company at its own expense. Parsons said that not only his company, but the Byron Jackson iron works, Code & Porterwood company, Pacific manfolding book company and other local manufacturing industries are required to pay the same switch hauling charges by the Southern Pacific company and also by the Santa Fe company.

## WEIGHTED BODY IS FOUND IN THE BAY

OAKLAND, Sept. 26.—An unidentified body of a laborer about 45 years of age was found early this morning by S. J. Oberg, night-watchman for the Judson iron works, in the tide flat of the bay back of the iron factory.

The man's hands were tied together in front of him and about his waist were suspended two fish plates weighing 25 pounds each. Nothing in the clothes would serve to identify the man except an employment card, bearing no name, issued by Murray & Ready of San Francisco, September 17. This was in the breast pocket of the coat.

## BOYS ARE SPILLED FROM CANOE IN LAKE

OAKLAND, Sept. 26.—Bud T. Weynd and Lloyd Laingor, each aged 17 years, were saved from drowning in Lake Merritt by rowers who went to their aid when their canoe capsized in the deep water. Neither of the boys could swim, and they were exhausted when taken ashore. Laingor lives at 1339 Harrison street.

## MEN WHO BUNKOED FARMER CAPTURED

OAKLAND, Sept. 26.—E. Chisa, Joseph Costa and Glone Tomani were arrested today at Santa Cruz and brought back to Oakland to be tried for swindling Giovanni Bianchi, a Santa Rosa farmer, out of \$1,100 in a bocci game. Peter Bassallo, Frank Conegan and Pellegrino Guiseppo were arrested this morning by Detective Drew in Broadway as suspected swindlers. The men had bought nearly all the confederate bills in the second hand shops of this city. Later the police learned, they had exchanged \$190 in cash for dollar bills.
