Johnson Greeted Like Hero Mining Towns Enthusiastic People Flock to Republican Banner In Most Doubtful Counties

ANGELS CAMP, Sept. 27.—If sentiment in the southern mines district is any criterion the story of the November election already is told. If the whole state of California follows the lead of some of the most doubtful counties all that remains is the counting of votes to determine the extent of a tremendous landslide to Hiram W. Johnson and the republican ticket.

No better test could have been put upon Johnson's popularity and upon the popularity of the cause he represents than today's tour. He has been in counties which four years ago gave Theodore Bell a sweeping majority and he has found those counties today aligned solidly behind the republican banner.

TOUR LIKE CONQUERING HERO'S

Traversing El Dorado, Amador and Calaveras counties, Johnson has met with such a reception that it is said, have had the office of chief if he had so desired at the time Jesse B. Cook was appointed to that office, and his friends say that the mayor feels inclined to rely upon him to bring the force under the proper discipline. He would not, they say, resign his position with Wells-Fargo, but would get leave of absence, so that in the event of something occurring to compel him to resign, the office of chief he could return to his old position. MEETS CAR EVERY MILE

DEMOCRATS FOR JOHNSON

Johnson's guides and companions today have been men who know the political situation in these mountain counties better than any others, and their report of existing conditions has been most glowing. One of the leading men of Sutter Creek, for instance, reported the names of 35 democrats of that city who have enlisted under the Johnson banner and pledged him their support, and declared that he did not know of a single republican who would desert his ticket.

PROSPEROUS FARMER DRINKS FATAL DOSE

Peter Eggers Ends His Life by Taking Acid

STOCKTON, Sept. 27.—Peter Eggers, a prosperous farmer of the Vernalls section, committed suicide last night by swallowing carbolic acid. He was seated outside his home when he drank the fatal draft. Walking inside he said to his wife, "I have taken poison. Give me a drink of water." His wife hastened to comply, but when she returned with the glass he remarked simply, "Never mind, I don't need it now." Eggers fell over on his bed and expired while his wife was removing his body. He leaves a wife and four children.

SAN FRANCISCAN DIES OF MORPHINE OVERDOSE

Selma Victim Supposed to Be Charles L. Smith

FRESNO, Sept. 27.—A man supposed to be Charles L. Smith of San Francisco, who was made public by Selma Janet of that city, died today in Selma as the result of taking an overdose of morphine. In the man's pocket was found a letter of recommendation from the Mutual biscuit company of San Francisco, and members of that concern said that the man was probably Charles L. Smith, who worked at their establishment.
