COURT SUSPENDS DR. MARTIN TRIAL

Lawyer Asks Judge Conley to Instruct Jury to Acquit Physician

[Special Dispatch to The Call] PRESNO, Oct. 31.—The trial of Dr. Jackson L. Martin, accused of willful neglect to furnish his dying wife with necessary medical attendance, was interrupted today when D. S. Ewing, one of the attorneys for the defense, moved that the trial terminate and that the court instruct the jury to acquit, arguing that Doctor Martin had complied with the statute under which he is being prosecuted and that in order to bring out his testimony which the prosecution desires, Doctor Martin should have been charged with involuntary manslaughter.

SAN FRANCISCO ENDS HIS LIFE IN NAPA

M. C. Merrick Commits Suicide With a Revolver

[Special Dispatch to The Call] NAPA, Oct. 31.—A man believed to be M. C. Merrick of San Francisco committed suicide yesterday afternoon by shooting himself in the head with a revolver. He was about 45 years old, was bald, had on a black suit and a white stiff shirt and weighed about 160. The officers of Napa are looking for his relatives, who, it is believed, live in San Francisco.

LAW FORBIDS PLEDGING VOTE, SAYS CANDIDATE

Charles A. Bliss Declares He Favors Oriental Exclusion

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, Oct. 31.—Reproached by the federated trades council for refusing to pledge his support to a measure favoring the exclusion of orientals from such privileges as ownership of lands and admittance to school with white children, assembly nominee Charles A. Bliss asserts that he can not under the law pledge himself to vote for any measure. He says he favors oriental exclusion, but would be violating a law if he pledged himself to vote for such a measure.
