



WOMEN ON CAMPUS PLEIN SAYS TAX SYSTEM IS FAULTY

Professor Gives Reason Why Amendment Should Be Voted For

OAKLAND, Nov. 4.—That land is overtaxed and that banks and other corporations are not paying their just share of taxation was declared today by Professor Carl C. Plehn of the University of California at a luncheon given by the Trinity rotary club.

The present system offers too many opportunities for tax shirkers," he said. "Twenty years ago the state board of equalization discovered that Los Angeles county was underassessed and was paying barely 30 per cent of its value, or a half of what the other counties of the state were paying."

Head of German Department at University Gives Impressions in Magazines

BERKELEY, Nov. 4.—The democratic idea permeating the university must be attributed to the fact that women were admitted "on terms of equality with men," according to an article in a Munich magazine by Dr. Fritz Winter of the German department of the university.

He describes the California women as a distinctly new type of feminine beauty. He comments on the freedom of their life as contrasted with the chaperoned women of Europe. He is impressed with the cordial relations, approaching almost to comradeship, apparent between the men and women students of the university, and in this connection he describes the university functions.

Tracing further the influence of the democratic idea in California, the writer dwells on the American system of self-government, and he says that in the development of this system the University of California occupies a place in advance of other American universities.
