Fresno Ministers Formally Announce Objections to Affair of Parlor Club

[Special Dispatch to The Call] FRESNO, Dec. 19.—Following a meeting Saturday of the Fresno Ministerial union, at which the Kirkness, to be produced in this city Wednesday, was discussed, the union today passed a set of resolutions denouncing the press notices and pictures which have been given for the production and denouncing the production itself, stating in the resolutions that they assumed the pictures to be true representations of what takes place in the production.

Assuming that the reports occurring in the newspapers are representative of the actual Kirkness, we deprecate such a presentation to the public as tending toward the immoral. "Recognizing the high purpose and aim of the women of the Parlor lecture club and its great promise for the future, we wish to conserve its largest usefulness and, as well as those of the general community, we make protest of anything that tends to lower the standard of moral ideals, and if those pictures, with which reference has been made, do in fact represent the Kirkness, we trust the club will take occasion to disclaim the same."
