

PALMER AND PAULA COMPANIES MERGE

F. L. Brown Arranges With Capitalists for Consolidation of Oil Interests Corporation Will Control About 2,500 Acres in Santa Maria, Ventura and Midway

Negotiations have been completed for the consolidation of three of the best known California oil companies. They are the Palmer Senior, the Palmer Junior and the Paula. They will be operated henceforth as the Palmer Union company with a capitalization of \$6,000,000.

LAND IN CAT CANYON

The bulk of the territory is located in Cat Canyon near Santa Maria, adjoining the famous Palmer properties. The land is distributed as follows: 1,830 acres in Cat Canyon, 160 acres near Santa Paula, Ventura county, a lease of 400 acres in the same county and 40 acres in the heart of the Midway.

Plans for the big combination were laid by Brown nearly a year ago. He visited New York in the interest of his enterprise and was able to obtain the co-operation of capital in the eastern metropolis.

It is intended to press the development of the entire property. Although the stock arrangement calls for 6,000,000 shares, half are held in the treasury.

The Palmer Jr. company embraces 2800 acres, on which three wells have been begun. The first well has been drilled to a depth of 2,500 feet. It has passed through 800 feet of oil sand and it is to be driven to the 3,100 foot level. The second well has reached 1,000 feet and the third well has been started recently.

FOUR PRODUCING WELLS

The Palmer Six contains 950 acres, also in Cat Canyon. There has been no development of this property, which was but recently acquired by Brown.

The Paula has four producing wells on its Ventura property and the same number on its Midway holdings. It has produced 300 barrels of oil from its Midway wells on a 200,000 barrel contract at 50 cents.

While some of the principal owners of the Palmer and Palmer Union are identical, the managements are separate. The directors and officers of the new Palmer Union are as follows:

JURY ACQUITS BROWN OF CHARGE OF MURDER

Car Conductor Again Hears Verdict of "Not Guilty"

Charles V. Brown, a United Railroads conductor, was acquitted by a jury in the case of the murder of Harry Beane, June 10 last. The jury was out only eight minutes. Brown and Beane quarreled at the end of the Valencia street line, and the conductor struck the other man, knocking him to the ground. Beane sustained a fracture of the skull.

No one saw the fight except Elizabeth Gleason, a nurse at St. Luke's hospital, and she was too far away to hear what was said. Brown testified that Beane became abusive to him while he was raising the fender of the car and that he merely pushed him away.

This is the second time Brown has been acquitted of a charge of murder. During the car strike of 1907 he killed O. P. Obermeyer by shooting him during a riot on a Polk street car, but the jury found that he acted in self-defense.

WOMEN WANT MONEY FOR JUVENILE HOME

Advised to Present Matter at Time Budget is Prepared

Urging the necessity for new quarters, Mrs. C. M. Weymann, Mrs. A. S. Gardner and Miss Josephine Malloy, the auxiliary members of the juvenile home, appeared before the public buildings committee of the supervisors yesterday. They asked that an appropriation of \$125,000 be made to provide a large, permanent juvenile home.

While strongly in favor of the petition, Chairman Nelson advised the committee of women to go before the supervisors next May, when the annual budget is being prepared.

This matter came up once for a bond issue, but the sum asked, \$250,000, was voted down.

Will of Real Estate Man Filed for Probate

Burke, widow of the testator. The only specific bequests are \$5,000 to Mrs. S. Helena Steadham and \$5 to Mrs. Edith Merian. The widow is made executrix without bonds. The petition for letters testamentary states that the estate exceeds in value \$15,000 and that the income from realty is more than \$500 a month.
