

George Burns in St. Paul For Hogan or Burns, Survivor

TO THE VICTOR OF THE LIGHTWEIGHT BATTLE HAS ATTRACTED ATTENTION OF PUGS THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

By WILLIAM J. SLATTERY Judging from the way they are being challenged, One Round Jack Hogan and Frankie Burns are looming up on the pugilistic horizon as two of the most important lightweight developments around San Francisco in many a long day.

Walter Francy, Hogan's manager, accepted Powell's challenge later on. "Hogan will go against any of them," said Francy. "He is not planning to pick his men. All he wants is a worthy opponent."

Powell returned from New York with a very creditable record. He has fought the toughest of them back in Gotham, and for very small money at that. He could not get with Knock-out Brown, Sammy Smith, Harlem Tommy Murphy and other heavyweights.

Powell was looked upon as a possible lightweight champion till a year ago last November, when Al Wolgast took him in a 20 round bout. Since then Lew's stock has diminished a bit, but on his eastern tour he picked up a back a lot of his lost prestige.

In the meantime Antonio la Grava is still hot on the trail of the winner of this month's card. Manager Sam Fitzpatrick refused to let Hogan fight, but says he will even go so far as to make a side bet of \$10,000 on the Butcherer boy.

There is an air of confidence in the camps of Hogan and Burns that is both convincing and deceiving. Each man believes that the other is especially made for him. Since their fourth round engagement, last August, Hogan has always scoffed at the mere mention of the name of Burns, while the latter has pleaded for a return match all these months.

No matter how the battle ends, it certainly will be the most hard fought and important fight since the two men have been engaged in. A good, clever, scientific boxer like Burns, pitted against a hard hitting, speedy, rushing performer like Hogan, is sure to make things hum, and the fans are beginning to realize this.

Burns is doing all of his work now with Bob McAllister, the husky Sacramento welter, and Abe Lerner, the hard hitting local lightweight. The Oakland boy has practically decided to pass up all the clever, rapid fire performers and stay with the two men now on to the tough ones, so that he may be more rugged when he faces Hogan on Friday night.

Burns' work system for Lerner consisted of four rounds each with McAllister and Lerner. Frankie abandoned about half of his science and devoted most of his time to slugging and tearing into his opponents. He appeared to be just as strong and just as aggressive as either of them, and his snappy left handed hooks told every time they landed.

Burns still weighs in the neighborhood of 137 pounds. He is heavier and stronger now than at any other time since he started boxing some two years ago. From the way he takes the blows that are rained on him by Lerner and McAllister he should certainly be able to give Hogan the surprise of his life.

Hogan also spent a busy day over at Billy Shannon's San Rafael resort. After a lively and successful afternoon at the gymnasium in the afternoon and then devoted most of his attention to a four round engagement with Trainer George Green, who is one of the best trainers in the art of fast and accurate hitting with both hands.
