The wedding of the couple was quiet. Accompanied by one friend, P. M. Zivernin, the couple presented themselves to Father Kennedy at St. Mary's church December 27, 1909, and asked to be married.

The complications were hidden for some time. Then there came a slip up. The dizzy span of life that Hoffman was living buckled in the middle and the two ends came sharply together.

What meant a heart break to the girl meant something more sinister to the man. There was a prospect of a trial for bigamy. A steamer was about to leave for Australia.

WRITES DAUGHTER, THEN DROPS DEAD

Edward T. Sterling's Body Is Found When Office Is Opened in the Morning

A few minutes after he had written an endearing letter to his 13 year old daughter Madeleine, who is in an Oakland convent, Edward T. Sterling, automobile dealer, clubman and a former banker, dropped dead, a victim of heart failure, Monday night in his private office at 555 Golden Gate avenue.

His body was found yesterday morning shortly after 7 o'clock by C. P. Seeborg, chief salesman, who opened the door. Mrs. Sterling, who was formerly Miss Louise Auserals, daughter of a San Jose banker, was notified, and her brother visited the city yesterday afternoon and had the body removed to San Jose.

COMPLAINED OF ILLNESS Sterling complained of feeling ill Monday. He could not be persuaded by A. J. Smith, his business associate, to do anything at noon, and the afternoon had a number of vertigo attacks. These he mentions in his letter to his daughter.

WAS AUTO ENTHUSIAST Sterling was 42 years old and a native of this city. He leaves a widow and two daughters, aged 9 and 13. He was married 16 years ago in San Jose. At that time he was connected with the Security state bank of San Jose. Later he moved to this city and was manager of the Van Ness branch of the Central trust company.

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MEXICAN REVOLT GROWING RAPIDLY

Rebels Win Battles and Many Flock to the Standard of Madero

led by Colonel Ortega near Olinaga. Defeated federalists and killed 150 out of 200. Another victory near Casas Grandes obtained by Casillas with 300 insurgents against federalists led by Colonel Rago.

Casas Grandes and nearby railroad stations are at the mercy of the rebels. General Navarro is completely cut off and there is no news from him.

The insurgents hold a strong position between Navarro and Chihuahua. Durango has joined Chihuahua and Sonora against Diaz. Near Torreon insurgents have 600 men well armed. They recently engaged federalists, killing one of their leaders, a son of Colonel Gonzalez. The dispatch closes with the statement that the insurgent movement has gained vastly within the last month.

The fact that the federal forces of Mexico suffered heavy losses in engagements with revolutionists near Galena and that they still were calling for reinforcements was reported to the state department today in a telegram from the United States consul in Ciudad Juarez.

Galena is 180 miles southwest of El Paso. They overtook troops, numbering 500, were attacked January 20 by 600 insurgents, the battle lasting two days. News, the consul adds, is being strictly censored, and great anxiety prevails in the interior.

Border Is Guarded EL PASO, Jan. 24.—To guard the border and prevent Mexican rebels from crossing into Texas 46 men and officers from Fort Bliss left this morning for Polvo station, 40 miles east of here. That is the point where Mexican officials allege 200 insurgents crossed from Texas Sunday night. Mexican cavalry has been sent down from Juarez to watch the border on the Mexican side of the river.

A correspondent of the Times who arrived here tonight from Casas Grandes states that the federal loss in the battle of Galena is placed at 180 killed and 40 wounded. The insurgents' loss cannot be ascertained, but it is known to have been heavy.

Skirmish fighting still is in progress around Galena, but with little effect. Rabago's main command still is at Galena.

Failure, Says Elder Madero [Special Dispatch to the Call] GALVESTON, Tex., Jan. 24.—Francisco Madero, father of Francisco I. Madero, leader of the Mexican revolution, declares the rebellion in Mexico for which his son is held responsible is a failure. The aged Madero, who was counted among the wealthiest land owners in Mexico, said he opposed the movement, not because he believed his son wrong, but because conditions were not such as to warrant the dissolution of the government by force. He is a friend of President Diaz and believes that the latter's death will precipitate trouble in Mexico.

As asked about his son, he said he knew nothing about him, not even his whereabouts, except from newspaper reports. After young Madero escaped into Texas just prior to the revolution the Mexican government confiscated all of the property of the Madero family, but, by order of General Diaz, the property of the elder Madero, aggregating more than 20,000 acres, and other property has been restored to him.

This old man will spend the winter in Texas and return to Mexico in the spring.

FEDERAL CALIFORNIA REBELS DOUGLAS, Ariz., Jan. 24.—Alamos, between Metzuma and Hermosillo, in the hands of Colonel Severiano Talamantes, a former government commander who turned insurgent rather than arrest his three sons for treason. Talamantes took with him into the rebel ranks a detachment of 100 federal troops and with them joined a force of 300 citizens who declared for Madero against Diaz.

There was much talk among Mexican refugees crossing the border today of a report emanating from rebel sources that the state of Sonora would secede and make Madero president of the republic of Sonora. This state seceded some years ago and since that time has been practically under martial law.

The rebel count on capturing Hermosillo, the largest city in the federal territory, and setting up his government there.

CALIFORNIA COMPANY CAN ENTER NEBRASKA Mutual Insurance Company Was Barred by Auditor

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 24.—The Pacific Mutual Insurance company of California, which has been in the United States court, when Judge Fungler sustained the plea of the company and declared that it had a right to do business in Nebraska. Former State Auditor Earle barred the California company from Nebraska because local firms were not admitted in that state in reciprocal terms. The ruling of the insurance commissioner is reversed.
