


Markie Wins the Classic Waterhouse Cup in a Comp

LAST STAKE RACE OF THE SEASON PROVES BURLESQUE

Winner Finishes Two and a Quarter Miles Fifteen Lengths in the Lead

The Waterhouse cup, at two and a quarter miles, the last of the feature events on the New California jockey club's program, was captured yesterday by W. C. Weaver's 4 year old, Markie M, a well played second choice in the betting. The Gerolstein horse was the class of the field, and he romped away with the long distance feature without an effort, beating the nearest contender, Azo, the favorite, by 15 lengths. Fulletta, the only other of the five entries to run the distance out, was third. Old Clamor, which was favored by many owing to his known likeness for a distance, broke down during the running and pulled up in bad shape.

Five horses went to the post. The three entries of E. Moyné—Chester Krum, Whidden and Star Actor, were scratched. Azo and Markie M opened equal chances at 2 to 1, but on the former's known likeness for a distance, he was made the choice at post time, his odds remaining stationary at 2's while Markie M receded to 11 to 5. Sir John was well placed at 9 to 2, while Fulletta came in for a good play at 1 to 1. Clamor was the outsider at 5 to 1.

Eddie Martin, aboard Markie M, sent his mount to the front at the rise of the barrier. The Gerolstein horse went along in his natural free stride without an effort. Azo and Markie M opened equal chances at 2 to 1, but on the former's known likeness for a distance, he was made the choice at post time, his odds remaining stationary at 2's while Markie M receded to 11 to 5. Markie M was running strong, with no indications of weariness. Azo moved up on the backstretch of the last mile, but it was apparent that he was not equal to the task of running down Markie M. The latter kept still and ran as if he were a gallop. Balance all in Markie M simply galloped all the way. Azo the steady one of the balance, Fulletta thoroughly done at a mile and a half. Other two never in it.

Interest centered in the running of the Waterhouse, but other events on the card furnished some exciting sport and a couple of the races were keenly contested. It was another bad day for favorites, as but two of them won in the seven events on the card. Roy Junior and Monaback were the choices to reward their backers. The biggest surprise of the afternoon was the victory of 3. M. Gray's gelding, Endymion II, which won the fifth event on the card at odds of 25 to 1. Rosevale opened favorite at 4 to 1, but receded to 2 to 1. The favorite ran a dismal race, finishing next to last. Torbellino had the early foot, but tired in the stretch. Endymion II, which had been lying back of the pace, finished with a great rush in the middle of the track and outgamed Raleigh at the end. Eddie Grady was third.

FAR AWAY SCHOOLS TO SEND TRACK TEAMS TO BERKELEY

Salt Lake City and Eureka High Desire to Enter Interscholastic Contest

BERKELEY, Feb. 11.—Salt Lake City high school is the most recent addition to the list of secondary schools which have sent in entry blanks to the chairman of the Pacific Coast interscholastic committee. The committee is offering to pay a percentage of the total expenses of teams which come from a great distance, and this fact is accountable for the large entry list from schools outside the state, over 12 having already filed entry blanks. The students of Eureka high school are desirous of entering a team and are to present a play to raise the necessary funds.

For the first time in years Los Angeles high school will probably be represented by a bona fide team in an interscholastic track meet. Although a number of athletes from the southern school have taken part in various meets, they have not really represented their school, owing to the fact that the principal of the institution made the ruling some years ago that no team representing the school could take part in meets held outside Los Angeles county. As the Pacific coast interscholastic is to be held in Berkeley, it is believed that the principal of that institution will reverse his decision.

Among the promising athletes who are likely to enter from Los Angeles high are: Captain Rubio, sprinter; Sheldon and McPie, weightmen; Stanton, a brother of Forest Stanton, one time captain of the California varsity track team; Mickey McClure, quarter and half mile sprinter; Dawson, a brother of Ward Dawson, the Stanford sprinter; Simpson, quarter miler, and Ward, who clears close to six feet in the high jump. The various under-graduate classes in the University of California.

Since the Pacific coast interscholastic is to be held the week following the Pacific coast conference meet, a number of the high schools situated in the vicinity of the different colleges will send their teams in company with the college men.
