MARE ISLAND IS UNDERBID IN EAST

High Cost of Transportation of Material Operates as Handicap to Western Plant

VALLEJO, Feb. 26.—Mare Island will have to content itself with building a collier this year, according to reports that have reached the yard during the last few days from Washington, D. C., to the effect that eastern yards have underbid the local station for the construction of the two revenue cutters for the treasury department. The limit of cost for the two ships was \$500,000. The ability of the easterners to underbid is said by the officers here to be due to the fact that the Boston, New York or Norfolk yards benefited by the low rates they have on the shipment of material.

ABOUT the handsomest buffet in San Francisco is that of the Del Monte, located at the corner of Powell and Ellis streets.
