HOLDUP? WHY, THE IDEA! JAIL FOR HIM

Jury Dubious About Story of Hitting Wrong Man; 14 Years, Says Dunne

Charles E. Waldman, convicted of a holdup, was committed to Folsom for 14 years by Judge Dunne yesterday.

Waldman met C. W. Irish near Mission and Twenty-second streets on the night of December 18, 1910, and after beating him with his fists robbed him of \$6.

Waldman related that he fell asleep on a Mission car and rode beyond his destination. When he got out of the car, thinking Irish was a man with whom he had had trouble at a dance, he beat him.

"I hit the wrong man," Waldman said. He also said that he had been drinking.

William Warren, a negro, convicted of burglary of second hand clothing, was sentenced to four years in San Quentin by Judge Dunne.

Robert Farrell, who entered the store of H. L. Hill, 424 Grant avenue, was sent by the same judge to Folsom for one year.

Judge Lawlor imposed a sentence of three years on Roy Gatti, convicted of horse stealing.

George Edwards, convicted of attempted burglary, was committed to Folsom for three years by Judge Lawlor.

Citizens Suspected of Disloyalty Taken From Homes and Shot at Night

CAPE HAITIEN, Haiti, March 4

This city is experiencing a reign of terror approaching that of 1905, when citizens suspected of disloyalty to President Nord Alexis were taken from their homes at night and shot.

Arrests by the military continue and the prisons are filled. The local jail, designed for the confinement of eight persons, is occupied by 18. The prisoners arrested are chained in pairs. The frightened peasants no longer come to town with food supplies and a famine is threatened.

FAVORITE TENOR IN RURAL PLAY

Richard J. Jose Will Sing His Old Time Successes in "Silver Threads"

Richard J. Jose, the world's greatest contra-tenor comes to the Princess for a week commencing with the matinee today in "Silver Threads," a play of New England life in four acts.

The story of the play is founded on the old familiar song of our fathers' time, "Silver Threads Among the Gold," which is incidentally sung during the first act by Jose, who will be well remembered by his former connection with notable musical organizations. "The Old Homestead," and the vaudeville. Jose, last season, for the first time in his career, nearly a quarter of a century took up the legitimate drama as a means to give to the public and his many admirers, the familiar ballads and hymns, the singing of which has made him famous.

Ten years elapse when the man who was responsible for her wrong appears upon the threshold of the life of a younger sister, and is about to succeed in his plans when the girl, who was driven from her home, returns as an accomplished opera singer, unrecognized by her relatives, and in a strong dramatic scene denounces the betrayer. While the scenes are strong and full of heart interest, they do not in the least border on the melodramatic and the more serious portions are relieved by a strong vein of bright comedy.

Jose is seen in a part created especially for his peculiar type and nature, which he portrays in a most natural manner. He has an opportunity to sing his ballads and hymns, without inconsistently dragging them into the play and marring the trend of the story.

LESS THAN 2,000 CALL FOR MAIL ON SUNDAYS

Postmaster Fisk Considering Closing Windows on Sabbath
