

FAIR SITE FIGHT POPS IN SENATE

San Francisco Delegation Divided in Boosting, Each for His Own Section

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—Whether the Panama-Pacific International exposition should be held in Golden Gate park, Harbor View, Bay View, San Diego or Los Angeles became a topic of discussion in the senate this afternoon.
 Casady of San Francisco, who has been subdued since the indignation following his absence Wednesday that resulted in an all night call of the senate, started the debate by introducing a resolution advising the exposition directors to hold the fair in Golden Gate park. He complained that a similar resolution, introduced a month ago, has never emerged from the councils of the San Francisco delegation, to which it was referred.
 Welch of San Francisco protested that various portions of the city desired to have the fair, and Burnett, Bryant and Wolfe spoke for their sections.
 Wright of San Diego and Gates of Los Angeles offered to solve the dilemma of the San Franciscans by holding the fair in their cities. The resolution finally was referred to the San Francisco delegation where it will slumber peacefully until the end of the session.

INHERITANCE TAX BILL AMENDMENTS ARE LOST

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—After a hard struggle, in which the administration forces were compelled to put on the screws this afternoon, the assembly receded from its amendments to the Stetson inheritance tax bill.
 M. R. Jones of Martinez urged the assembly to stand by its amendments to exempt the wife and lineal descendants up to \$24,000 and to leave with the superior judge of the county instead of delegating to the state controller, the power of naming inheritance tax appraisers. L. D. Bohnett asked the assembly to recede.
 "I have more confidence in the superior judge of my county than I have in the state controller," asserted T. F. Griffin of Modesto, in opposing the proposition.

GOVERNOR JOHNSON PUTS VETO ON PLUMBING BILL

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—Senator Tom Finn's pet measure, creating a state plumbing board, was vetoed by Governor Johnson today for two reasons. First, the governor does not believe in unnecessary commissions. Second, because the governor and the attorney general agree in believing that the bill is unconstitutional, anyhow.
 In addition to the board many plumbing inspectors were provided in the bill. Municipal plumbing inspectors were to work under the direction of the state board.
 Finn did not vote today when the senate voted "no" on the regular motion, made after each veto, that the bill become a law despite the executive veto.

GREATER LOS ANGELES BILL DIES IN SENATE

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—All the consolidation hopes of Los Angeles and San Francisco were destroyed today, when the senate refused to adopt the Hewitt greater Los Angeles constitutional amendment. Senator Wolfe, whose greater San Francisco amendment was defeated some time ago, supported the Hewitt amendment today in the hope that through it the people about San Francisco may find votes upon consolidation. The vote on the measure brought out 21 yeas and 11 nays.

BILL DECLARING WAR ON MOSQUITOES PASSES

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—Death for the malarial anopheles, which is a mosquito, is contained in a bill passed by the senate today and now up to the governor. It permits county supervisors to organize mosquito belts, tax the district in which the campaign against the malarial carrier is to be made and attack the breeding places of the anopheles with oil and other destructive agencies.

SISTERS, COUSINS AND AUNTS BARRED

Brothers, Mothers in Law and All Other Relatives of Officials Tabooed

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—With 20 assemblymen indicating their belief in nepotism in public offices, Brown's bill to prohibit the employment of relatives of consanguinity within the third degree by legislative, state and local officials passed the assembly today with 43 affirmative votes. Clyde Bishop of Santa Ana showed his animus by giving notice of motion to reconsider, thus delaying the bill to such an extent that there is very little chance for it to get through the senate.
 Should the Brown bill become a law it will put a stop to the patronage system, which has brought shame upon the legislature time after time. Many members make it a practice to put wives, sisters, brothers, sons and daughters on the payroll during sessions. Two years ago one senator from Los Angeles was so eager to dip into the pork barrel that he had his mother in law named as a porter.
 The anti-nepotism system, on record as favoring nepotism are as follows:

ANTI-ALIEN BILL IS FORCED ON ASSEMBLY

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—The senate anti-alien bill was forced out of the judiciary committee of the assembly tonight by a vote of 29 to 22 on a resolution by N. C. Coghlan and assigned by Speaker Hewitt to the foot of the second reading bill. Coghlan, however, will place the bill on the special urgency file tomorrow and thus rush it to consideration by the house despite the efforts of the administration to prevent the enactment of any such measure at this session.
 The bill provides that no alien not a citizen and no corporation, a majority of capital stock of which is owned by aliens, shall acquire title to or own land or real property in the state, except that the act shall not apply to property now owned in this state by aliens or corporations, and that all such aliens or corporations acquiring real property in the state by devise or purchase under legal process enforcing a debt or lien in favor of such aliens or corporations, may hold the same for the period of five years. Provision is also made for the district attorney to enforce escheat proceedings.
 At a meeting of the judiciary committee held last night, the bill was reported back to the assembly, but at the request of the governor, in compliance with a telegram from President Taft, this action was rescinded. The original was to let the bill die in committee, but Coghlan brought it back to life tonight.

"BLIND PIGS" ESCAPE LEGISLATIVE CENSURE

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—Assemblyman Dan Rindlinger's piggy bill was today vetoed by Governor Johnson. It was aimed at "blind pigs," and held that the presence of a federal license should constitute prima facie evidence.
 The governor stated in his veto that the offense of selling liquor without a license was one for local regulation and ought not to be made a felony.
 He believed that no conviction could be obtained with all parties subject to prosecution.

RAILWAY LIABILITY BILL PASSES SENATE

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—Bills are held liable for any injuries to their employees, whether they result from breakdowns in the machinery or any other cause, by a bill passed in the senate today. The measure was favored by Assemblyman Kehoe, Roseberry, whose employers' liability law was signed by the governor some days ago, opposed the Kehoe bill on the ground that it is unconstitutional and unnecessary, as it covers part of the ground embraced in the Roseberry law.

SENATE PASSES BILL MAKING APPEAL EASY

CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRAMENTO, March 25.—It will be easy for

convicted criminals held in county jails during appeal to secure their liberty on bail after a bill passed by the senate today becomes law. The measure, which was introduced by Senator Julliard, provides that the judge's discretion in permitting the prisoner to go on bail "shall be exercised in favor of the lib-

eration of the defendant pending such appeal."
SENATORS OPPOSE THE RESTRICTED PHONES
CALL HEADQUARTERS, SACRA-

MENTO, March 25.—Cafes and saloons may have party telephones on which there are private residences, so far as the law of California, will interfere in the matter. The senate today defeated McDonald's bill prohibiting these different sorts of customers from being placed on the same party wire. Stetson


