

FLOWER SHOW TO CONTINUE TODAY

Great Success of Venture Is Cause of Prolonging the Display
Long List of Prizes Is Announced for the Best Exhibits

So successful has been the flower show and so generous have been the people of San Francisco toward the little sufferers of the children's hospital that Angelo Rossi and the women assisting him have decided to continue the exhibition this afternoon and evening.

The baskets of cut flowers which were the feature of yesterday's display were so near perfection that the judges had considerable difficulty in awarding the prizes. The first premium was merited by the Misses Hannon, who presented a wicker basket filled with branches of the purple Judas blossoms, deep pink tulips and magenta peonies, and tied with velvet ribbon of the same shade.

The second and third prizes were won by A. E. Warlow of Alameda. The former was a low, round basket containing a medley of fruit blossoms, and the latter a beautiful arrangement of lavender, wistaria and white apple blossoms. Miss C. F. Williams won the fourth prize with a basket filled with anthurium, white cyclamen and blue hyacinth. The fifth prize, awarded the Hackell floral company, was for a conception of white marguerites and yellow poppies.

The most original floral design, won by the Stein & Levin company, was a giant hat of maiden's hair with a turned up brim of white narcissus and trimmed with a wreath of pink roses and a sheaf of mixed flowers. The second premium, awarded the Podesta-Raldocchi company, was a duplicate of the picture, "Will It Come to This?" printed in last Sunday's Call.

For all those who exhibited in the flower show diplomas, presented by the horticultural society, were awarded in lieu of cash prizes. The following premiums were merited by professionals who did not enter into the general competition:

H. Plath—Special prize for collection of Primula obconica.
Delioano, Rossi & Co.—Special prize for large exhibit of Easter eggs.
MacBoris-McLaren—Special prize for exhibits of oriental anemones, wistaria; collection of evergreens, bay trees and palms.
Domoto Bros.—Special prize for collection of flowering plants and evergreens.

Miss Marian E. Christensen, San Rafael—Special prize for blossoms of flowering peach.

The first prize for the best collection of roses grown under glass, 25 blooms in each vase, was won by E. W. McLellan, the second prize being awarded the Domoto Brothers, these including three vases of different varieties, the best vase of American beauties, the best vase of red roses and the best vase of any other variety.

The first prize for carnations, which included the best two vases of different varieties, 50 blooms in each, the best vase of anchovies, 50 blooms, and the best single vase of any other variety, 50 blooms, was won jointly by H. L. Goertz and the Redwood City nursery. The second prize was awarded the Adachi Brothers. The Ferrari Brothers won a first prize for the best collection of hyacinth; George A. Pope for the best vase of single yellow tulips, 25 blooms, with the Ferrari Brothers as the winners of the second premium. Pope also won the first prize for the best vase of single crimson tulips, while the Ferrari Brothers merited the same for the best vase of single red and yellow tulips, 25 blooms, and the best vase of double pink tulips, 25 blooms, and E. W. McLellan for the best vase of single trumpet narcissus. For the best vase of single narcissus the first prize was won by Pope.

FINAL DECREE FOR CLERGYMAN'S WIFE

Mrs. du Moulin's Promptness in Applying for Papers Is Basis of Rumor

Mrs. Jennie G. Du Moulin was granted a final decree of divorce by Judge Graham yesterday from Walter H. Du Moulin, formerly an Episcopal clergyman in this city. The interlocutory judgment was signed March 31, 1910, and the fact that Mrs. Moulin

secured the final decree as soon as it was legally possible to do so was responsible for a suggestion that he contemplates remarriage. Frank H. Gay, her brother, denies that this is so. Mrs. Du Moulin's divorce was on the ground of desertion and willful neglect, her testimony being that during a period of three years her husband had given her only \$10. She charged further that in San Francisco and other places where he had officiated as a minister of the church he had neglected his wife and spent his time with young and attractive parishioners. One morning he got up very early to go walking with a young woman, and when Mrs. Du Moulin protested he said to her, "Shut up, or I'll make you."

At the time of the interlocutory decree Du Moulin had left the ministry and was employed as an insurance solicitor in Seattle. Mrs. Du Moulin was allowed \$75 a month alimony. Herman E. Rehffuss, the tailor who narrowly escaped death from a bullet

which he alleges his wife fired at him, began suit for divorce yesterday on the ground of cruelty. The shot, which was fired through a window as Rehffuss was descending the back stairway of his residence, struck a woman who happened to be passing by in the hip. Mrs. Rehffuss was arrested on a charge of assault to commit murder. On various occasions, Rehffuss charges, his wife has threatened to kill him. Divorces were granted yesterday as follows:

PLUMBER PLUNGES 50 FEET TO DEATH

James Ford Tries to Crawl on Ironing Board to Gain Entrance to Flat

Attempting to crawl on a board from one window to another to enter his home and not awaken his sleeping family, James Ford, a plumber living at 2249 Fulton street, plunged 50 feet down a lightwell Friday night, crashing on the cement pavement below and receiving injuries from which he died

yesterday. Ten of his ribs had been fractured, both legs broken and he had been internally injured.
Ford had been at a meeting of the plumbers' union and, upon his return to the flat where he lived, discovered that he had misplaced his latchkey. He went to the rear of the house, ascended the stairs and crawled in through a small laundry window. He placed an ironing board from the laundry window to the sill of the window that opened into the kitchen. He then started across on his hands and knees. When half way over, the weak support gave way and Ford was sent hurtling into the air. He fell down the shaft, his body striking the side of the house as it plunged downward.
It was not until two hours afterward that Mrs. Ford, hearing her husband's moans, went to his assistance. He remained conscious until a few minutes before he died. Ford was 48 years old. He leaves a wife and four daughters, and a brother, Thomas J. Ford.
