PATRIOTIC SERMON TO BE DELIVERED

Services Will Commemorate the Firing on Fort Sumter and Outbreak of War

OAKLAND, April 22.—How Grant came to Lincoln will be the subject of a patriotic sermon to be delivered tomorrow morning at the First Congregational church by Rev. Robert W. McLaughlin.

The choir of 100 voices will repeat Brahms' "Requiem" at the afternoon services. The solo parts will be taken by Mrs. Alma Berglund Winchester and H. D. Mustard.

About 150 children are included in the first communion class that will receive the sacrament for the first time tomorrow morning at St. Anthony's church.

The sermon at Mills college tomorrow morning will be delivered by Rev. Edward L. Parsons, rector of St. Mark's church, Berkeley, whose subject will be "The Living Christ."

Dr. C. R. Hamdenschield of Chicago will conduct a special evangelistic campaign this week at the Eighth avenue Methodist church.

Services will be conducted at the First Baptist church by Rev. E. A. Woods, who will preach on "Is Life Worth Living at the morning service and on "The Value of Today" at the evening service.
