

# Anglers Enjoy Day's Fishing and Picnicking at Point Reyes

## WOMEN VIE WITH MEN IN PISCATORIAL ART

### California Anglers' Association With Families And Friends Seek Prizes

Hundreds of members of the California anglers' association, with their families and friends, went up to Point Reyes station, in Marin county, to celebrate the organization's fourth annual reunion and field day yesterday. Although weather conditions in the city during the early morning hours did not make the outlook for a good day out of town any too promising, the attendance of fishermen and their guests was fully up to expectations, and it recalled, furnished for the occasion, to carry the picnickers to the fishing grounds.

As on past occasions of a similar character, the association hung up many valuable and useful prizes for the best catches of fish made during the day, and the contests for these trophies were, of course, the principal features of the outing. Nearly every one prominent in local angling circles, who could manage to get away from the city for the day, went up to the "point," and the general interest taken in the affair by sportsmen made it a success in all respects.

Weather conditions were not just right for fishing at all times during the day, but there were more than enough fish in the baskets turned over to the judges to make a cleanup of the two score prizes offered for the best individual catches. The fishing grounds were on the Paper Mill creek and its tributaries and all winning catches had to be turned into the judges' stand at the "White House" pool before 3 o'clock. The judges, who were selected from participants on the ground, were Sheriff Tom Finn, Hugh Draper and J. X. DeWitt.

Before the awards were made a barbecue lunch, prepared by Charles F. Heidenstein and Harry G. Gosliner with a corps of assistants, was served gratis at the "White House" fishing hole. Twelve hundred pounds of bread with half that many pounds of beef and the usual barbecue trimmings were disposed of between 1 and 3 o'clock, after which time the prizes were awarded.

The first prize in the leading class, which was for the best basket of trout taken on fly only, was won by William J. Street with a splendid basket of tealhead creel from Nicolas creek. G. Bennett won second and B. Comery took third prize in this class.

W. J. Black, M. J. Frankenberg and Charles Art, finished in the order named in the contest for the best general catches with any kind of lure. Dr. L. T. Craney and Frank Smith took the first two prizes in the event for members only.

Frank Poulter secured first prize in both rifle and revolver events. With the rifle, Poulter had a score of 315 and his mark with the revolver was 341. Captain John E. Klein was second with the rifle, having a total of 306, and E. H. Siltor won second place in the revolver competition with a score of 331.
