Although Judge J. M. Seawell refused yesterday to stay the sale of the defunct California safe deposit and trust company's building at the southeast corner of Montgomery and California streets, the building was not disposed of.

Architects Send Plans of Oakland City Hall With Two Stories Added

OAKLAND'S MAGNIFICENT NEW CITY HALL

OAKLAND, May 1.—Palmer & Hornbostel, the New York architects, whose design for the proposed \$1,000,000 city hall was accepted by the board of public works and awarded the first prize of \$5,000, have sent to Mayor Mott revised plans for the building, which will provide, at no greater cost than the first estimate, two additional floors in the building.



The city hall will be the tallest structure in the city. It will be 17 stories high, ending in a cupola, with a flagpole surmounting a huge electric globe. The globe will be at the apex of the tower, and will signal the hours of the night, just as chimneys in the tower will strike the hours by day.

The new design adds to the singular beauty of the building. The structure will be a masterpiece of classic architecture with the modern business building. The first two floors will cover the whole large site of the hall, west of Washington street, extending between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets. The facade will show a spacious entrance leading from Washington street by a broad granite staircase. Columns will flank the entrance, and pilasters will supply severe ornamentation to the front and sides. The windows will give this great flat low structure the appearance of having

OFFICERS ORDERED TO WAR COLLEGE

President Details Men From This Department to Receive Special Instruction

President Taft as commander in chief of the army has detailed the following officers of this department to the army war college at Washington, D. C. for special instruction: Lieutenant Colonel Robert L. Bullard, Eighth infantry; Joseph A. Gaston, cavalry; Majors Clint C. Hearn, coast artillery corps; George B. Duncan, Second infantry; Captains Frank K. Ferguson, coast artillery corps; Charles S. Lincoln. They will report for instruction not later than August 15.

Captain Jacob C. Johnson, coast artillery, has been detailed on the board of officers who will examine the candidates for West Point military academy at the Presidio, this city. He relieves Captain Frank D. Ely of the Thirteenth infantry.

The war department order directing Lieutenant Colonel Charles M. Pruitt to proceed to join the Eighth infantry at San Diego has been revoked. He will remain on duty at his present station.

Under orders from Washington, D. C., First Lieutenant Arthur Pollon, Fourteenth cavalry, and present aide de camp to General Tasker Bliss at San Diego, will report in person to Lieutenant Colonel Nat. P. Phister, Thirteenth infantry, for examination for his promotion to the grade of captain.

Troops C and D, First cavalry, have arrived at the Presidio from their duty on the Mexican border. Orders have been issued whereby the two troops, with troop D of the same regiment, which is also at the Presidio, will depart for the Yosemite and Sequoia national parks for patrol duty May 10.

The following officers have been appointed as an examining board and before it for promotion: Captain Robert Alexander, Nineteenth infantry; Captain Philip Yost, coast artillery corps; Captain George M. Apple, Fifth field artillery; Captain Robert L. Richardson, medical corps; Captain William H. Richardson, medical corps.

LOSS OF TEMPER COSTS ASHE \$50

Lawyer Tells Lawlor What He Thinks and It Proves Expensive

For losing his temper and referring to an action of the court as "indecent," Attorney R. Porter Ashe was adjudged guilty of contempt of court yesterday morning by Judge William P. Lawlor and fined \$50. Ashe promptly offered a \$100 bill, which the court attaches were unable to change, but later satisfied the judgment by sending the proper amount in cash to the court by messenger.

The judgment of contempt occurred in connection with the arraignment of Mrs. Inez C. Peterson, charged with forgery, for whom Ashe is appearing temporarily as counsel. The latter took exception to an order of the court refusing a fourth postponement of the case and setting May 15 as the date for trial. Rising angrily from his seat, he bitterly arraigned Judge Lawlor.

"Of course, you can order it set aside as you see fit," he cried, "but I want to state now, and I think it my duty to do so, that I think the haste in this case is indeed of a perfectly make it physically impossible to prepare the case if I am to try it, and I am not going to stand here."

As the matter now stands Mrs. Peterson has been arraigned on a charge of attempt to defraud by forgery and the case will go to trial May 15. Mrs. Peterson was arrested in San Francisco early in March, following an attempt to obtain a loan of \$10,000 from the Frankman investment company by representing herself to be Mrs. Henrietta Farrelly, the widow of a wealthy Oakland banker. When arrested she insisted that she was Mrs. Farrelly, and it was several days before her true identity was discovered. She is reported to have been in similar trouble in Oregon and Washington.
