

KEEP FAIR OUT OF PARK, URGES ENGINEER HALL

Former Superintendent Declares Exposition Would Spoil Beauty of Resort

Adds That Benefits to District Will Be Nothing Compared to Cost

The "put it" proposition is still the theme for debate among the members of the executive committee of the Panama-Pacific exposition company.

The committee met yesterday afternoon in the Merchants' exchange building and talked over the four sites which are considered practicable—Golden Gate park, Harbor View, Islais creek and the Lake Merced-Sutro tract.

There will be a further meeting this afternoon, when engineers of the board of public works and other engineers will discuss with the exposition committee the various sites under consideration.

William Ham Hall, the engineer who was superintendent of Golden Gate park for the first seven years of its development and consulting engineer for the board of park commissioners for several years afterwards, has written a pamphlet addressed to the Panama-Pacific exposition committee.

In his open letter Hall takes a decided stand against the site of Golden Gate park as a site for the Panama-Pacific international exposition.

In summing up his arguments Hall makes the following points against the use of Golden Gate park: The fair would destroy the character of the western part of Golden Gate park.

Resolution Against Park At a meeting of the Lake Merced exposition association, held last night in the rooms of the Mission promotion association, a resolution was adopted protesting against Golden Gate park being selected for the 1915 fair site.

EARLY HEARING IS SOUGHT FOR ACCUSED TRIO

Rappaport Wants Formality of Arraignment Over in a Hurry

Detective Burns Starts West to Be a Witness at the Trial

As the arraignment was a mere legal formality, there was no reason for further delay in that.

No one connected with the defense has yet received any definite knowledge of the indictments returned against the accused men. The charges will be read when they are arraigned.

District Attorney Fredericks said today that the transcript contained more than 1,000 pages of testimony concerning the alleged plot which culminated in the blowing up of the Los Angeles Times October 1 last, and that it probably would be at least one week after the arraignment before the prisoners would be ready to enter their pleas.

Judge George H. Hutton, who succeeded Judge Bordwell as presiding judge yesterday, announced today that he would not transfer either the arraignment or the trial to any other department.

That Orle McNamagal will play a star part in the trial of the McNamaras, nothing is known of the course he will pursue and nothing will be known until the opportunity to enter a plea reveals his attitude.

In some official quarters it is hinted he will not be called upon either for a plea or for trial until he has testified, as District Attorney Fredericks said he would, against the McNamara brothers.

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J. A. Gray, general organizer for the carpenters, said that there probably would be more carpenters quitting.

Major W. M. Wright of the Eighth infantry, recently detached for service at department headquarters, will sail for the Philippine islands on the transport leaving this port Friday.

New Move Made in Eddy Will Contest Glover Seeks to Deny Agreement With Mother CONCORD, N. H., May 2.—Counsel for the plaintiff in the action of George W. Glover of Lead, S. D., against Henry M. Edder, executor of the will of Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science church, today filed a motion to amend their amendment of March 25, by adding the averment that the agreement made by Glover prior to his mother's death not to contest her will "was not made with her, but was made only with the defendant, McClellan and the other directors, whose purpose, unknown to the plaintiff, was, if possible, to make secure to themselves the fruits of Mrs. Eddy's illegal residuary bequest to them of more than \$2,000,000, of which money they were then in possession. In the agreement and in McClellan's purpose therein Mrs. Eddy took no part." The "McClellan" referred to is Archibald McClellan.

The committee will inquire into the general relationship of the government to its employes in different departments and cabinet officers will be asked to testify.

Fight for Fry's Place WASHINGTON, May 2.—A three cornered fight over the election of a president pro tempore of the senate to succeed Senator Fry is in prospect.

Senator Bacon probably will receive the democratic vote.

Debate on Free List WASHINGTON, May 2.—Protection and free trade were the themes of today's debate in the house over the democratic bill to put agricultural implements, certain food products and manufactured articles on the free list.

Tilson of Connecticut said his state usually referred to in tariff debates as a manufacturing community, held a large and important farming interest, but that the farmers refused to be caught by the "farmers' free list" bill or the democratic measure.

S. W. Smith of Michigan and Burke of South Dakota (republicans) opposed the measure because of its assault upon the doctrine of protection. Carlisle of Missouri said that the bill would give a farmer foothold in the United States to the growing Japanese trade.

Byrnes and Sims of Tennessee and Lever and Burns of South Dakota (democrats) defended the bill.

Mondell of Wyoming charged the democrats with using the Canadian reciprocity bill, which passed the house and now is in the senate, as a wedge for the resumption of complete free trade.

Investigation Asked INDIANAPOLIS, May 2.—The Merchants' association of Indianapolis today adopted resolutions "unequivocally demanding that a most thorough investigation be made into the recent charges which connect Indianapolis with the many dynamiting outrages which have taken place throughout the country in the last two years."

FRESNO PUPILS ORDERED TO GIVE UP SOCIETIES Education Boards Requests Signatures to Declarations [Special Dispatch to The Call] FRESNO, May 2.—An ultimatum to those students in the high school who have thus far refused to renounce secret organizations, was served today when printed declarations were given the students to sign.

Without any mental reservations whatever, I hereby certify that I have resigned and renounced whatever membership in or pledge to, or otherwise connection with, any organization prohibited by the Fresno board of education, and I promise and agree, in accord with the letter, spirit and intent of the above prohibition, that as long as I am a student in Fresno high school I will not become a member of, or pledged to, or in any way connected with, any such prohibited organizations.

Students disobeying are to lose credits and standing.

NEW TRIAL ORDERED IN WIRELESS FRAUD CASE Prejudice Alleged and Entire Jury Discharged NEW YORK, May 2.—A new trial of Christopher Columbus Wilson, president of a wireless company, and his associates who are charged with misuse of the mails, was ordered today by Judge Martin in the United States district court.

Prejudice on the part of one of the jurors was shown yesterday and the entire jury was discharged this morning.
