SENIORS DISSIPATE COACH'S DILEMMA

College Champions Refused, but Older Women Come to the Rescue

BERKELEY, May 6.—The original plans of Coach Fred Carlisle and Composer Edmund Walker of the senior extravaganza, which will be staged the night of May 12 as a feature of the commencement exercises of the University of California, have gone awry as far as the basket ball girls are concerned.

Carlisle had intended to have the champion blue and gold team, which defeated both Stanford and Nevada this year and made a clean sweep of the courts, take part in the basket ball scene, which will be a feature of the chorus work.

There is a rule on the campus, however, that no men are allowed inside the tanark basket ball court, and under this university regulation the women refused to take part on the Greek theater stage, where more than 6,000 spectators would see a game which under ordinary circumstances was denied to the men students.

A way out of the difficulty has been found by selecting a dozen of the best athletes among the women of the graduating class of 1911 to do the basket ball stunts on the Greek theater stage. A real game will be played and there have been some lively rehearsals in preparation.

The girls are said by Manager Howard Krueger to be nursing skinned knees, bruises and scratches as the results of hard falls on the cement stage of the university. The game during the musical play, according to Krueger, will be real.

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
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DUCKING SERVED BOY RIGHT, SAYS JUDGE
