

6,000 and less than 20,000; sixth class, population 1,000 and less than 6,000; seventh class, population 500 and less than 1,000.

COMMISSION GOVERNMENT
Chap. 418, adds four new sections to the act providing for the organization, incorporation and government of municipalities by authorizing the boards of trustees of cities of the fifth and sixth classes to submit to the electors the question of adopting the commission form of government.

NAME-CHANGE OF
Chap. 81, authorizes any municipal corporation to change the name of the city or town by adopting an ordinance to that effect.

OFFICERS
Chap. 85, amends section 705 of the act providing for the organization, incorporation and government of municipalities by authorizing the board of trustees to elect officers and members of the board of trustees.

PERSONAL PROPERTY
LIENS
Chap. 435, amends section 3051 of the civil code relating to liens on personal property by providing a lien on the property of automobiles.

Real Property
ESTATES-TERMINATION OF
Chap. 414, amends section 750 of the civil code, relating to the termination of estates by terminating tenancy or other estate on notice in writing to tenant from landlord.

Public Health and Quarantine
ADULTERATED FOODS AND LIQUORS
Chap. 437, repeals the act of 1887 to prevent the adulteration and misbranding of food and liquors.

ORGANIZATION VALIDATED
Chap. 735, validates the organization and incorporation of all municipal corporations which have been organized since the year 1900.

PARKS, MUSIC AND ADVERTISING
Chap. 420, provides that cities, except those with freholder charters, may levy a tax not exceeding 15 cents on the value of advertising matter.

POLICE COURTS
Chap. 359, amends sections 7 and 12 of an act to establish police courts in cities of the second and third classes.

POLICE DEPARTMENTS
Chap. 614, amends the act giving members of the San Francisco police department the right to have their benefits determined by the superior court.

PUBLIC FERRIES
Chap. 423, adds section 2896 to the political code to provide that the voters of cities and supervisors shall not apply to municipal ferries.

STREETS AND SEWERS
Chap. 32, authorizes the legislative body of any city to create sewer districts within its boundaries.

DEATHS, BURIALS, ETC.
Chap. 122, amends section 15 of the act for the registration of deaths.

INFECTED CATTLE AND STOCK
Chap. 150, provides that the importation of cattle into the state is prohibited unless such cattle are accompanied by a certificate from a competent veterinarian.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES
Chap. 250, amends section 2079A by adding the names of certain infectious diseases to the list of diseases reportable to health authorities.

MEDICINE AND SURGERY
Chap. 740, amends the act regulating the practice of medicine and surgery.

NARCOTIC DRUGS
Chap. 681, amends the act of 1907 to regulate the sale and distribution of narcotic drugs.

OCCUPATIONAL DISEASES
Chap. 480, requires medical practitioners to report to the state board of health all cases of occupational diseases.

STREET RAILROADS
Chap. 43, amends section 400 of the civil code by providing that the legislative body of any city may acquire street railroads.

VACANCIES-FILLING OF
Chap. 41, amends section 854 of the municipal government bill providing for the filling of vacancies on the board of trustees.

WATER AND LIGHTING
Chap. 34, amends sections 2 and 14 of the act of March 21, 1908, providing for the lighting of public streets.

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Chap. 70, provided for the adjournment of the legislature sine die midnight, Monday, March 27, 1911.

Chap. 2, approved an amendment to the charter of San Francisco, ratified by the voters November 10, 1910.
