THE profession of house keeping is extensively practiced among what are known as society matrons in San Francisco. Not a few of them are excellent cooks, like Mrs. Prentiss Cobb Hale, who employs a chef of some foreign kind, of course, but is quite qualified to criticize his efforts intelligently and offer suggestions. Her chafing dish efforts are famous, and there was once a dinner for 12 guests entirely prepared by this clever amateur. So foolishly, Mrs. Hale believes.

There are other charming chateaines to agree with her. Mrs. Will Tevis has rarely attractive surroundings, whether in Bakersfield or San Francisco or at her villa on Lake Tahoe, and she is a perfect mistress of her home. So also is Mrs. Henry Crocker, with one of the most delightfully "homelike" establishments of the mansion class.

There is another charming chateaine, however, who frankly hates direct house keeping, that is, the subjective sort where one is in the thick of it. Personally she has nothing to do with it, and is on speaking terms with only her maid and the house keeper. At luncheon one day some one spoke of the entree, to add: "You have an awfully good cook, Edith."

"Yes, he is good," said Edith, "and I don't know whether he's French or Chinese. We've had him two years, but I've never seen him."

Strangely uncaring of Edith, the guests thought. One might in two years care to look at the composer of such entrees. But Edith had none of a house keeper's interest in details like the cook, and will probably descend eventually to living in hotels.

## SANTA FE TO PAY \$25,925 DAMAGES IN ARMY BILLET'S

[Special Dispatch to The Call] MARTINEZ, May 19.—The jury in the case of the Richmond dredging company against the Santa Fe railroad company this afternoon returned a verdict finding for the plaintiff in the sum of \$25,925. The total asked was almost \$100,000. The case has been on trial here for the last five weeks. The suit was the outcome of a dispute regarding certain reclamation work which was being done in 1909 in Richmond and the dredging company, of which H. C. Cutting is the president, sought recovery for nonpayment of money due and for damages sustained.
